Submission to Wellington City Council Long-Term Plan Sustainability Trust 15 May 2018

Priority Area: Housing

Wellington Housing Strategy

We are fully supportive of Council's housing strategy that aims to provide a sustainable solution for quality, affordable and appropriate housing in Wellington. The Trust's expertise and work areas focus on provision of healthy housing and we will address our comments to our work areas that overlap with Council including:

- Warm Up NZ
- Home Energy Savers Programme
- Rental Warrant of Fitness
- Healthy Homes Guarantee Act
- Residential Tenancies Act
- Regional Healthy Homes Initiative

Warm Up NZ: Healthy Homes

Council and Sustainability Trust have been working together over more than ten years to provide insulation to low-income homes. Funding provided from Council, Hutt Mana Charitable Trust, Capital and Coast DHB, Sustainability Trust and Energy Efficiency and Conservation Authority and others has enabled over 4000 low-income Wellington households to achieve the benefits of a warm dry home.

Insulation is the foundation of a healthy home and has been the target of central government's energy efficiency programmes since the year 2000. The current programme which provides overall subsidies to low income homes will expire on 30 June 2018. However, we are awaiting announcements from government in the national Budget (17 May 2018) on continuation and possible expansion of the programme.

We encourage Wellington City Council to continue to provide leadership and support for this programme in the form of financial subsidies and marketing. Pooling of funds from Council, EECA and others has significant short and long-term benefits for the health and wellbeing of vulnerable Wellington households. Council has provided funding in the range of \$200,000 to \$40,000 per annum over the past ten years. Obviously the higher the funding the more homes we can assist, and we encourage Council to consult with us on the level of investment and the best use of funds towards this programme.

Home Energy Savers Programme

HESP has been operating in Wellington since 2012, and has been delivered by Sustainability Trust since 2015. The programme provides a free home visit, report and subsidised energy efficiency measures to households throughout Wellington city.

Council provides sufficient funding for up to 600 home energy assessments per annum. Each visit takes 2 hours and includes a detailed report tailored to the homeowner outlining areas for

improving the energy efficiency, comfort and health of the home. The Trust is constantly oversubscribed for this programme, such is its popularity. Word of mouth referrals are significant, and client satisfaction is very high.

We encourage Council to continue to invest in this programme at current levels of approximately \$60,000 per annum. As above we are keen to continue discussions with Council as to the future level of investment and best use of funds — especially as legislation is introduced from central government in the form of the Residential Tenancies Act, Healthy Homes Guarantee Act, and the Zero Carbon Act. The introduction of these pieces of legislation is having and will continue to have a significant impact on housing quality and energy use in homes. Ensuring the HESP continues to assist homeowners meet or exceed the requirements in this legislation and meet other Council resilience priorities will require some redesign which we are keen to engage with Council when legislative changes are enacted.

Rental Warrant of Fitness, Residential Tenancies Act, and Healthy Homes Guarantee Act

Sustainability Trust was the delivery partner for the Rental WoF designed by Otago University and Wellington City Council. The WoF was designed to encourage landlords to reach minimum standards for a healthy and safe rental property. The programme was launched as a voluntary programme, with the intention to eventually become mandatory in coming years.

While the WoF set minimum standards around energy efficiency, housing quality, and safety, the new Residential Tenancies Act and Healthy Homes Guarantee Act have to some extent gazumped the provisions of the WoF. While still to be put out to consultation the HHGA will likely set some higher standards around heating and insulation than required in the WoF and the RTA. However, as we have mentioned previously, there is still scope for Council to assess the new healthy housing landscape to provide a leadership role and Wellington Housing Standard that exceeds the standards of the national legislation.

We are concerned that the government may legislate weaker standards for rental properties than the HHGA has the scope to deliver and Wellington would be well placed to set a higher benchmark for rental and owner-occupied properties. Using experience from the WoF, HESP, WarmUp NZ and other housing initiatives (such as earthquake resilience assessments), Council could champion and brand a gold standard for Wellington homes. This could include using similar benchmarks and assessment protocols that are standard in Europe and Australia Capital Territory (such as Energy Performance Certificates). Council's leadership with Rental WoF has shown that it is possible for local authorities to take influence national legislation and the drive for higher standards.

Regional Healthy Homes Group

The Regional Healthy Homes Group's vision is *Everyone in the Wellington Region lives in Warm Dry and Safe Housing by 2025*. The group comprises organisations from Wellington region health, social sector, community and local government organisations. We have come together to develop a regional and consistent approach to healthy housing. Many housing issues cross local authority and district health board boundaries and we firmly believe that working collaboratively at a regional level will yield better results than working only within our own areas of influence.

The Group has been meeting since late 2017 has in the process of firming up an MoU that will spell out commitments and input (time and financial) from stakeholders. Council has attended a number of meetings and we encourage continued input as we develop a longer term strategy and work plan.

Summary

Sustainability Trust and Wellington City Council have been partners in healthy housing delivery since 2006. The quality of Wellington homes is still far from perfect and continued investment of resources and effort is needed to bring homes up to a healthy housing standard. Over the next six years national legislation will provide a foundation for a huge leap forward in both the quality of housing and affordability of household energy. We strongly encourage Council to continue to engage in dialogue with regional housing stakeholders and consider its role in creating a Wellington standard that provides national leadership.

I strongly support the Council's strategy to enter a 'Decade of Culture' and for Wellington to invest more intentionally in its brand of cultural capital. While I definitely support investment in the city's large scale heritage performance venues, I echo the sentiment of many independent arts organisations that these are not venues that support the livelihood, innovation, accessibility or exploration of the city's truly creative arts community. Much of the lifeblood of the city's art, past and present, comes from an independent sector that rarely if ever connects with these venues due to their cost. I don't think that the strengthening and maintenance of these buildings should be considered part of an Arts and Culture strategy at all but rather grouped in with overall Sustainability and infrastructural strategy. I am very pleased to see a proposed increase in financial contribution to the Arts and Culture Fund, and also pleased with the proposed Performing Arts Fund of \$70k. These are a great start but will not have a major impact at these levels. While I support to some extent the drive to co-ordinate an arts programme, introducing new festivals and events especially, I am wary of divesting too much support from the independent initiatives that give the city an authentically diverse creative identity. Fundamentally, it's very important that representatives not only of large arts organisations but also smaller independents be included in consultation and development of this programme, to ensure that artists themselves are able to actively participate in, help realise and benefit from the activities. A focus only on the potential for mainstream attendance and tourism opportunity could end up counter-intuitively shutting artists out in favour of large arts organisation contractors and starving emerging talents of platforms and resources. In general, I think an approach to Arts and Culture that focuses on long-term strategies for making the city liveable and workable for artists - especially independents - will have the strongest impact in the longer term in terms of building a truly authentic cultural identity for Wellington City. This sector continues to overdeliver on minimal resources. Currently, too many of our best and brightest are leaving for (mostly) Auckland. We need to recognise that many of the celebrated cultural exports that originated in Wellington came from a grassroots of independent practise and gained national and international celebrity without any involvement in mainstream, large scale cultural events.

Accessibility Advisory Group Submission on the Long-term Plan

Introduction

The Accessibility Advisory Group is a Wellington City Council Advisory Group whose purpose is to provide the Council with feedback and suggestions as residents with lived experience of impairments.

The main roles of AAG are:

- Provide feedback and advice to all Council business units when required
- Be an information channel to and from the Council
- Advise the Council on accessibility issues of national and international interest
- Help the Council's engagement and consultation on accessibility issues with people who have impairments and with the wider community
- Represent the broad spectrum of issues for people with impairments in relation to the Council's activities

It is difficult for the AAG to provide specific feedback on the draft long-term plan because is does not contain any initiatives that are specifically intended to improve accessibility in Wellington. Despite all the areas having a clear link to accessibility the plan does not mention accessibility, disability or impairments.

The key points of our submission are:


- The number and proportion of residents and visitors to Wellington that would directly benefit from accessibility improvements is increasing as the population ages.
- The council needs to actively invest in its understanding and institutional knowledge of accessibility improvements to future proof the city
- The plan has no initiatives that will improve accessibility in Wellington City- Why not?
- Accessibility is not mentioned in the plan anywhere, and it is not clear to the AAG that accessibility improvements were considered in the preparation of the plan.
- The plan is not accessible.
- Council must consider and understand its role and social responsibility in regard to the UNCRDP and the New Zealand Disability Strategy.

The ageing population will increase demand for accessibility improvements and the Council needs to plan for this increase in demand.

The aging population will lead to as increase in the number and proportion of the population that would benefit from accessibility improvements. The graph below shows the relationship between age and disability.


Percentage of the population with a disability

The next graph shows that the projected population of people with a disability will grow. The projection is based on the application of the current profile of disability by age group to the Statistics New Zealand forecasts for Wellington City. It shows that the number of people who would benefit from accessibility improvement from 43,600 in 2013 to up to 71,900 by 2043.


Wellington City resident population with accessibility challenges

The proportion of Wellington City's population with a disability is projected to increase from 22.1% in 2013 to 25.9% in 2043. This indicates accessibility improvements will directly benefit an increasingly

significant proportion of the ratepayers. The Council need to plan to deliver more accessibility improvements.

AAG is concerned that there is not enough institutional expertise on accessibility in Council beyond AAG and some urban designers. We feel that AAG is the main source of thought leadership on accessibility in Council. The Council needs to actively invest in its understanding and institutional knowledge of accessibility improvement to be able future proof the city.

The plan has no initiatives that will improve accessibility in Wellington City- Why not? Accessibility is not mentioned in the draft anywhere, and it is not clear to the AAG that accessibility improvements were considered in the preparation of the plan.

The plan is not accessible and we want to remind the Council that guidance on accessible documentation is readily available from the Department of Internal Affairs.

Our advice is that the Council should build a team of Accessibility Advisors to ensure it has the knowledge, capability and capacity to deliver for future demands for more accessibility in Wellington City. Investing in 3 to 4 new staff members would improve the effectiveness of WCC and AAG.

New Zealand ratified the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRDP) in 2008. The purpose of the convention is 'to promote, protect and ensure the full and equal enjoyment of all human rights and fundamental freedoms by all persons with disabilities, and to promote respect for their inherent dignity.'

The New Zealand Disability Strategy 2016-2026 has identified 8 Outcomes. Council must consider and understand its role and social responsibility in regard to the UNCRDP and the New Zealand Disability Strategy.

The Victoria University of Wellington Students' Association Submission on the Wellington City Council's 10 Year Plan

Introduction

The Victoria University of Wellington Students' Association (VUWSA) is the student union representing all 22,000 students enrolled at the Victoria University of Wellington. Our association provides advocacy and representation within the institution, the city, and nationally. We provide a number of welfare services like a community pantry, free menstrual products and we have a full time advocate that supports our students on particular issues. We also organize safe and well facilitated events for our students on campus and around Wellington that provide a sense of community for our students. We are submitting as we believe Wellington has the potential to provide the best student experience, and that we should take pride in becoming a student city.

A Student City

Every year we have more than three and a half thousand new students move to Victoria University of Wellington to study. Almost all of these students will remain for a period of at least three years, with others staying even longer to complete their degrees depending on subject. As Victoria University is a also an excellent research university, some students continue with postgraduate study for a further period of time. Whether one likes it or not much of central Wellington is becoming a "student city", as well as areas in the southern ward.

To some the term 'Student City' might inspire fear rather than excitement, broken bottles and burning couches may spring to mind. But these images are based on misconceptions, and becoming a student city is not something we should run from. There is massive opportunity in Wellington to reclaim what it means to be a student city. Here we are lucky to have a caring and responsible student populace. Our students our civically engaged, and make good use of the many things our city has to offer when they can. Some of our students will settle here in Wellington too. The fact is, students are a big part of the fabric of the city, We are an economic, social, cultural, and oftentimes political force in the capital. This submission contains areas we believe investment and support would be beneficial for our students, and all residents in the city.



Arts and Culture

Venues

Wellington is known as having some of the most expensive venues which makes it difficult to not only draw international artists, but also for local talent to get on the scene. The council is currently discussing the construction of a new indoor venue, which we absolutely support. This venue needs to be as accessible as possible so it can not only draw world-renowned artists, but also so our young people in the city can engage with the venue.

Large venues are not the only area for improvement. Council can have a role to play in connecting communities and local organizations with accessible, small venues around town and supporting the usage of these spaces. This includes public council owned spaces, bars, art galleries, and community centres. Support in this area would be great for wider city, as businesses would benefit from these connections and residents would get to be a part of the facilitation of student events.

Public Spaces

Public spaces play an important role in having an enjoyable and recreative city. Thinking about how young adults want to engage with the city is important. This can be through a variety of ways everything from adult playgrounds to outdoor events and public art. These kinds of activities contribute to the wellbeing of not only our students, but everyone. On a side note, we have a Te Aro campus full of talented architecture and design students keen to make the most of their city.

Housing

Student Accommodation

Council must work with the University to provide space for dedicated purpose built student accommodation for students in their second, third and so forth years. Student accommodation is a policy which benefits everybody. Students are able to more easily transition into a market which they are inexperienced in, and there is more housing freed up in Wellington for young professionals and young families. It allows student communities to develop in a safe environment, and if constructed in strategically placed locations allows them to better engage with the city and have access to university services.



Rental Warrant of Fitness

A mandatory Rental Warrant of Fitness must have a place in the long term plan. We understand t there are central government restrictions on council's ability to enforce a mandatory Rental WoF. Nonetheless we believe effective enforcement of quality housing standards needs to be in the pipeline in some way. The introduction of the "Healthy Homes" legislation is a good first step to providing decent accompdation but we believe houses should not just be bare minimum livable, rather brought to a modern standard. We would be happy to discuss how we can achieve this goal.

Resilience and Environment

Community building

Community building is central to building resilience and having a city that is conscious of its role in respecting our environment. Most students have moved to Wellington from elsewhere and when they begin flatting around the wider city they can often find themselves feeling isolated. We want to work with the council on community building projects in areas in the city which we know are home to students. By connecting students with their community they have neighbours to turn to in times of emergency, and more than that they have a sense of ownership of the neighbourhood which they are now a part of. In particular we would love to see more local schemes for sustainable living which certainly exist in Wellington, but students are currently disconnected from e.g. community gardens, neighbourhood composting, rubbish clean ups.

Transport

Tō Waewae

When it comes to driving Wellington isn't like Otago or Canterbury. Having a car is expensive and unlikely. This means most of our students use public transport, cycle, or just have a good hīkoi. From an environmental, financial, and health perspective this is a great thing. However many of our students study late at uni, and when the winter comes this means going home in the dark. The council has made a lot of effort to have safer pathways for Wellingtonians and we want to see this effort continue by having more lighting and maintenance in locations identified to be problem areas, or potential problem areas. We don't want to wait for an incident to identify an area. We are happy to provide advice based on feedback from our students to be proactive in this space.

Cycling



We support the council's plan to include more cycle lanes in the city.

Sustainable Growth

A New Indoor Arena

We support the construction of a new indoor arena, provided it is accessible.

Housing

As stated earlier under housing, student accommodation is a must for sustainable growth in the city.

Sexual Violence

Ending sexual violence in Wellington

Sexual violence has massive impact on our community. Students are an at-risk group for sexual violence, and it can affect a person in any aspect of their life - at work, at home, at university, or in town. We also know that sexual violence affects the student Maori, Pasifika, LGBTQIA+, and disability communities differently.

As such we strongly support Wellington City Council having a goal to eliminate all sexual violence in Wellington. We would also advocate for keeping focus strongly on ending sexual violence in each community, as it affects them. We applaud an ambitious, open-minded approach to ending sexual violence, founded on a values-base of empathy, love, respect and honesty.

The following is a list of key steps needed to see this through. We are keen to work with WCC on this issue further, as we have already begun to do so.

- Bringing together key community groups that can work together to achieve the aspirational goal of ending all sexual violence in Wellington.
- Committing to and promoting a best practice sexual violence policy for all staff employed by WCC, and encouraging other employers to do the same.
- Facilitate training for all bar/hospitality staff about how to recognise and deal with sexually inappropriate behaviour.
- Ensure that WCC events are free from sexual violence, and develop tools for others to use in how to run sexual violence free events. Ideally, it would then become a



requirement of events booking WCC owned spaces that they have taken care to reduce possible harm from sexual violence.

- Assist with educating students in halls of residence, and in other areas of university life as well, about consent.
- Developing tools and resources to facilitate behaviour change in workplaces, homes, and in town.
- In all of the above, ensuring that the resources and messaging are appropriate and tailored for the all groups, specifically Maori, Pasifika, LGBTQIA+ and disabled.

The WCC and VUWSA

Partners in the Student City

Finally a word on our relationship with the WCC. Over recent years VUWSA has developed a strong relationship with the WCC on certain issues, and projects. This relationship has been with individual councillors, the Mayor, and certain members of staff. We want to continue and build on our strong and positive relationship and operate as partners in providing the best student experience possible for all of our students. We would like to see inclusion on advisory, oversight, and strategic committees for issues, locations, and changes relevant to our students. While we work with the university regularly, our point of view is quite distinct and it's important to have a student-centric voice on the council. As a whole our students are well behaved, engaged members of Wellington. It's time we work together to realize the potential of what that means, and do so in a way that is visible to our students so they can really see that Wellington is a city that cares about them, and is a city that is their home.

Infrastructure investment planning needs to account for greater costs and pressures especially in coastal areas and with higher overall construction costs and pressures. The proposed Movie Museum and airport runway both represent significant risks in terms of high financial and environmental costs, with inflated estimates of their economic benefits. Both should be cancelled and funding steered towards more flexible entertainment intiatives and more sustainable transport options. Diversify rather than expand.

I acknowledge the pressures on our city as the population grows and people face increasing difficulty accessing affordable rentals and buying a home. I support the Council having an active role in using the levers available to it to increase the availability of quality, warm, safe, dry housing that is affordable and that supports positive community development.My concern is that the Council \$\infty\$ \tilde{U}^2\$ s preferred option of selling off some of its existing housing stock and land to increase the availability of %0+affordable housing‰Ûª may have a detrimental long-term impact on the Council‰Ûªs capacity and commitment to provide social housing to the city‰Ûas most vulnerable families and individuals. I have opposed the Special Housing Investment Plan and Wellington Housing Strategy on this basis - and more generally because I think people need more information to be able to make informed decisions about the options presented. Wellington City Council has a reputation for its social housing programme ‰ÛÒ including international recognition and awards for Excellence in Social Housing, Leading Community Engagement Practice, Tenant Led Initiative and Inspirational Team Member. Much of this has been because of the commitment to community development and empowerment of tenants, alongside the provision of bricks and mortar. In the past six months we have seen signs that this focus is shifting; however, there has been a lack of transparency about this change. The award winning Community Action Team who are part of City Housing has all but disappeared, and there appears to have been a dramatic shift in the culture of the Council % Û as housing team % Û O with a much harsher approach in its engagement with tenants and a lack of communication with tenants about what \$\infty \hat{U}^2\$ going on. Examples include: \$\infty \hat{U}^\chi\$ the 2017 tenant review process was handled very poorly with tenants being asked for information without clear explanation of what was wanted and why; tenants felt their privacy was being interfered with through requests for full bank statements (when only details of income were needed); there was a lack of support provided to tenants to complete the process despite the clear vulnerabilities of the priority tenant groups (refugee and migrants, people with mental health issues, literacy issues, etc); tenants being sent letters indicating rent increases and potential evictions which caused considerable stress and anxiety; ‰Û¢ subjected to 'welfare visits \(\hat{W}^2 \) without clear and transparent processes; being told they have too many possessions, or too many boxes on the floor, or too many chests of drawers, or that they are causing health and safety issues without clear guidelines or natural justice processes; ‰Û¢ tenants being taken to the Tenancy Tribunal rather than attempting a problem-solving approach. This includes the recent phenomenon of tenants being taken to the Tribunal for parking in the wrong places within tenant parking areas ‰ÛÒ often young mothers with small children trying to manage getting children indoors when no parking is available. Having reviewed the Tenancy Tribunal decisions online I found approximately 40 applications by WCC City Housing since the beginning of the year, including 4 on one day that all related to tenant parking issues. Having more affordable housing in Wellington is a sound objective and one which I wholeheartedly support, but this should not be about diminishing services in our city that are aimed at assisting those who are the most vulnerable. Social housing tenants should have the opportunity to be housed, not just adequately, but to create homes in the context of supportive community and in proximity to community services that improve well-being. Having an active (and empathetic) community development programme focused on the Council %Ûas social housing tenants is a key aspect of this. To this end I also submit that the Council should also ensure that support is given to community organisations that promote and enhance community well-being (a goal that will hopefully soon be reinstated as a statutory purpose of local government). WCC needs to be more transparent about its proposed housing plans in order to get a clear mandate from the community. The housing proposal in the Long-term Plan is upbeat and makes it seem like it ŵûs win-win ŵûò ie, social housing + affordable housing, but we need to know what this really means before signing off on it. How will Council meet its commitments to upgrade existing social housing and maintain at least the same social housing capacity? How will Council maintain its commitment to social housing and do this in a way that acknowledges and supports the complex needs of some social housing tenants? What is affordable housing? Who will get to access it? How will Council ensure land or properties sold off remain in the supply of %Û÷affordable housing%Û¹ in the long-term?I support the focus placed on reducing homelessness in Wellington and see this as being significantly tied to the Council % Û as commitment to provide social housing and to combine this with an investment in community development. I also believe that much can be achieved by supporting key organisations working with vulnerable individuals and providing spaces in the city (particularly the inner city) where people can go without cost or fear of judgement and can be given opportunities to engage with services that can assist in increased well-being. This needs to be more than (and more compassionately framed than) ‰Û÷day activities for beggars‰Ûª as was described in the media in March.

We support the Decade of Culture. Thank you for giving art and culture such a clear endorsement. We love seeing Wellington as a centre for culture and the arts, and for many important NZ artists it is our beloved home.

Barbarian Productions, as a CNZ-funded Kahikatea organisation, were not long ago in the poverty loop of many independent artists in this city. As our organisation strengthens, we feel a responsibility to keep growing the independent arts sector, rather than just advancing our own growth. We sympathise with the need for some larger organisations to increase their funding support but are also aware of the direct competition on low resources and therefore the impact this may have on initiatives which support the sustainability of the independent sector. We would like to see the independent arts sector supported and the larger organisations investigate their own growth cycle.

We are driven by a question: what does real growth in the arts look like? How do we as larger organisations support the growth at the grassroots of the sector? Could there be a time when we move out of the constant funding structure to free up funding for emerging companies?

We believe it is all of our responsibility (funding bodies, industry organisations and artists) to protect the economic sustainability of being a practicing artist. We whole-heartedly believe in building a robust infrastructure for the arts in Wellington and see the opportunity for Wellington to be a national leader in this regard. But if the artists are not living sustainably, then our sector is not succeeding.

We support the CNZ submission. We want to sound a key note though of supporting the independent sector, which is the lifeblood of culture in the city and over-delivers on extremely minimal resources. This is the part of the sector which needs urgent attention. We want positive growth and progress. We join in to this conversation with some practical solutions which we would love to partner in offering to our sector. We want to offer solutions to the frequently cited problems.

We therefore have identified the following initiatives which would benefit the sector as a whole:

 Paid mentorships which upskill the industry and keep us all operating at high standards, reducing sector burn-out and easing the transition from tertiary training into the industry. This initiative allows professional development thus increasing income strands for emerging artists, whilst supporting the professional consultancy of experienced mentors.

- Living Wage for artists (incl. a survey of what independent artists are currently paid)
- Arts organisations are required to support the independent sector with their programs and initiatives eg. if the Movie Museum is built, what does it feed back to independent artists? Is there a local residency attached?
- Partnering with local businesses to grow capability and professional development – for independent companies, artists AND larger arts organisations, since we all need to keep growing
- Short business up-skilling course for artists and growing companies eg. as currently taught at Victoria University via the MFA – many artists do not have basic small business skills
- Accelerator program for emerging artists and companies (already discussed with Justin Lester) - a two year professional development for arts companies in rapid growth

Furthermore, we believe that earthquake strengthening for key heritage public buildings should not be seen as arts funding. The town hall is an important city venue that personally as a well-established Wellington company we have NEVER performed because it is too expensive for us to access, although we have attended many wonderful civic events there. This is not going to benefit many independent artists in Wellington city. We agree with Sam Trubridge's point below:

"Development of large venues/facilities will not grow the capacity for innovation and experimentation in the sector. These venues support conventional approaches to performance that are not attractive to artists working in ways that are contemporary, relevant, and unique (but neither should these spaces be left to fall into ruin...)"

Thank you once again for the opportunity to submit our views to the ten year plan. We are passionate about our city, and are very proud to think of the next ten years having an active focus on arts and culture. We would like to be part of a growth cycle for the arts that sees our sector more empowered, more autonomous, and applying our creative spark to become more entrepreneurial thinkers. There is an opportunity to partner with like-minded socially conscious businesses in the city to create a robust sector where the arts help us express our compassionate, humane identity, and set Pōneke apart as a national leader of healthy and sustainable arts models. Let's build a path ahead that really works!

We need to plan and build the connected safe-cycling network, using a consistent best-practice design. At the moment there seems to be too much local consultation and pandering the whims of small groups of locals. We wouldn't allow progress on roads to be hamstrung like this. This is not the way to plan a city-wide transport network. Wellingtonians support greater investment in cycling. Be bold and make it happen. All Council-owned parking spaces should be priced according to the demand, so that there is a target of 85% occupancy on each block. This is called demand-responsive pricing. It depoliticises the issue of parking prices, ensures the most efficient use of this public resource, and maximises the revenue stream that should be directly reinvested in the community. My submission is in regard to social housing. The foresight of past councils and elected representatives in establishing significant housing stock and social housing areas is a credit to Wellington and one of the features which brings diversity and cultural integration and understanding to our city centre and suburbs. To lose this as well as the ability to care for our own in need would be a great loss. Those who live in these homes are not a burden on the city as some might think and contribute a great deal, through their labour, their service and the life that families bring to the city centre where many could otherwise not afford to live. While the plan is well rationalised and paints the only other option presented as a poor one, I have concerns that sale of land or gradual change of use is often irreversible and goes against the explicit intent of those responsive for setting it aside. In addition I find it concerning that government and councils are moving towards public private partnerships. While not bad in principle, you only have to read "rich dad, poor dad" to realise that external parties are often just in it for the money. Overall Wellington city council and their team provide a very good standard of to tenants and level of care for their wellbeing. Including social wellbeing. I am not aware of other social housing providers who do this better or at a similar scale. If others are interested for money then why can't the council make similar returns in some areas with clear clauses around time frame for return to social housing rather than selling. It also seems that the ring fencing of social housing funds is being used as a reason for not investing additional funds. However the crowns intent around enforcing the ring fencing of housing funds was most likely to prevent the funds being taken out and spent on other projects as had happened in the past leaving housing stock degraded. Rather than to prevent funds being put in. The figures are millions but we also need to realistic that many single house properties in Wellington are now worth close to \$1M on their own. If we are to remain a city of life, families and culture rather than a city of commuters we need to retain space in the close suburbs and heart of the city for people who help to bring these, not just those who can afford it. Your plan could be better and has the potential to just make a few individuals a lot more wealthy rather than achieving the intent of those who have gone before us. Please don't be short sighted in this matter.

We as Wellington Independent Arts Trust, after discussion with other platforms representing a large sector of independent arts practice in Wellington would like to commend Wellington City and Mayor Lester on wanting to champion the city as a capital of culture and its intentions for a decade of culture. Wellington has changed considerably over the last 10-15 years and as you will be aware, accommodation and spaces for independent artists and those who are not salaried, to rehearse and create work are increasingly scarce. We want to work with you to support artists living and working in the city and presenting their work in new ways.

We therefore submit the following:

- Oft-cited cultural heroes like our own Gaylene Preston, Taika Waititi, Jemaine Clement, Brett McKenzie, Fran Walsh and Peter Jackson did not come emerge through large festivals or venues, but from the independent arts community. This community continues to over-deliver for minimal funding and support.
- Increased direct funding to the independent arts sector of \$250-\$500K PA to enable proven artists to be paid to develop their work and have development spaces would make an enormous difference to the city's future. The proposed performing arts fund is a good beginning but will not have a major impact at \$70K PA.
- WIAT's planned Embedded Artist programme aims to work with local organisations to build relevant and
 innovation-building partnerships for artists in order to stay working in an expensive city. We encourage
 WCC to prioritise projects that demonstrate good practice, as the Embedded Artist does, of paying artists for
 their time.
- Independent artists/organisations need consistent sector representation and consultation on boards and in
 the implementation of the city's plans. Involving artists in the design and development of civic projects is
 recognised internationally (and is being implemented by Dunedin City Council) as key to strong innovative
 cities. WCC has long expressed interest in placing artists into processes but this has never been
 implemented. We can help you to do this.
- Local groups and creators offer expertise in events and urban development. When it comes to venues,
 artists need to be included on boards and steering groups for development and redevelopment of venues
 such as the Town hall and Convention Centre. There are clear reasons why some venues are not attractive,
 which WCC events and venues staff may not always grasp. We can help with this linking of sector
 representation.
- Wellington-based artists and organisations should be the preferred local suppliers to events like NZ Festival
 / Matariki whilst ensuring this does not slide into parochialism. We recommend the encouragement of
 curatorial appointment for major events such as Matariki that reflect an understanding of the emerging
 excellence in the local scene.
- Whilst investing in buildings (Town Hall and St James) provides architectural consistency for the city, the
 development of large venues/facilities is not the principal way to grow the capacity for innovation and
 experimentation in the arts sector. These venues support conventional approaches to performance that are
 not always attractive to artists working in ways that are contemporary, relevant, and unique. This allocation

of funding be represented more accurately in the resilience and building infrastructure budget and not as 'investment in arts and culture'

- We recognise that artists could be supported by a leisure card and accommodation initiatives from Mayor Lester. We commend this and also recommend a full review and open discussion be run to understand reasonable and strategic ways in which WCC support artists to stay in the city.
- Finally, understanding the pressures and issues at different stages of emergence for the independent artist is a priority. This is with whom the future creative city germinates, and did in Wellington in the 1980s and 1990s. In a more challenging property market with more regulations affecting work presentation, Council needs to work proactively with key organisations like our own for the future. The majority of these artists work independently of major organisations and struggle with an infrastructure they report as not as strong for their work as in Auckland. We think WCC should carefully consider strategically where they are best to assist in resources and funding. The ground has shifted enormously in the last 10 years and this needs to be recognised and responded to as a matter of priority, investing in the city's cultural future the artists themselves.

The sector is keen to work with Wellington City Council if it wants to take the Decade of Culture seriously. We are happy to work with the Council on a summit to flesh out some of these issues. Thanks for responding to our concerns and interests fully.

Retirement housing...Another comment:I regret that I was unaware of the proposal to build a Chinese garden on Wellington's waterfront before the decision to do so was made by the Council. Had I been, I would have added my voice to those opposing it at the time. However, albeit it now after the fact, I cannot let this opportunity pass to express how puzzled and disappointed I am in the decision to create such an irrelevant and inappropriate feature in a prime location beside the iconic and unique harbour of New Zealand's capital city. My view is not based on racial or ethnic distaste - I am proudly of Chinese ethnicity. I would be equally opposed to the construction of a feature in that location that was strongly characterised by the iconography of, or explicitly identified with, any other nation than Aotearoa. I believe that diversity is a huge strength of modern New Zealand society, and that the more familiar we become with different cultures the more we expand our humanity. So my objection is not to celebrating different ethnicities, it is to the showcasing of another single culture by itself in such a prominent central position In New Zealand's capital. If it's part of a world garden, with distinctive features from many other national gardening traditions, then bring it on! How wonderful that might be! But what has a Chinese garden in particular got to do with Wellington? How will such a development contribute to the "strong sense of identity" included in the "people-centred" outcome of the city's vision? My family has had long associations with Wellington, emigrating here first in 1886, and over all those years my wider whanau has been pleased and proud to be part of and assimilate with (but also, I hope, add to) a richer "New Zealand" culture. I love Wellington, and I hope to live here always. But I love it because it's idiosyncratically itself, Wellington, made up of all its many parts, but more than any of them. It's taken New Zealand long enough to throw off the mentality of being an explicit colony of another country. Let's not start to look like one again by stealth.

It needs to be more affordable and well connected to get the critical mass using it which is necessary to have acceptable levels of service so people can rely on it. People drive to work in Wellington and pay for parking not because parking is affordable or it's nice to drive in the rush hour - and it's not! They drive in spite of these negatives because public transport costs about the same (or more), and is not frequent or reliable enough yet. Please enable multiple bus/route for all buses in Wellington, combined with train tickets so that people can get to their destination on one ticket across multiple modes - make it easy! Also please have a heart for our Gold Pass users and stop the restriction between 3:30 and 6pm as in Auckland, London and other cities. The evening rush hour is much more staggered, with people travelling over a longer period than in the morning and this restriction on our elderly people is an unreasonable one. Spend the transport money on services which are accessible to ALL demographics in our city and please don't squander it all on cycleways which are accessible to a limited demographic and are not proven to be successful in places where the real issue is bad culture between cyclists and other road users. Address the culture, reduce speed limits in key danger spots, get cyclists into (green) spaces away from heavy traffic and get everyone sharing the existing infrastructure. I'd like to see cost effective methods used (like the tried and tested simple painted lanes) rather than the elaborate Island Bay type of solution which costs millions and serves no-one as it doesn't address the fundamental problem of road user culture. Wellington City Council Long Term Plan submission

May 2018

Thanks to the Council for inviting submissions to the LTP.

Since it formed in 2014, the Vogelmorn Community Group (VCG) has re-activated the former Bowling Club building and adjacent Council-owned green into a community space and revealed the vibrancy of a supposedly sleepy suburb. The space hosts not only locals, but also specialty users from around Wellington, largely from the arts with performing artists using it as a rehearsal space, and other city-wide groups e.g. the Baha'i or Shia communities, or chefs preparing food for Newtown market, Cuba Dupa and Dragon Boat races.

The venue and it role as a community hub has proven its value to the suburb and city. We note that this and the adjacent Vogelmorn Hall complement the immensely prestigious but expensive-to-refurb, -maintain and of course -hire arts venues in the inner city. This makes it accessible and attractive to independent and emerging or mid-level artists, whether for Fringe and touring shows, Capital E, or programmes and festivals hosted in-house. We also noticed an interesting development at the end of 2017 whereby government agencies including MBIE (Office of the CE), MPI (Animal Exports), Treasury (Legal Team) and Medsafe hired it as a novel yet affordable venue for their end-of-year bash over a more soulless and expensive central venue.

In light of this, we request that the Council:

- a) note that the Vogelmorn Precinct including the Bowling Clubrooms is an essential part of the city's ecosystem of facilities generally, and performing arts venues specifically;
- b) **commit** to supporting uture VCG requests for assistance in its ongoing work to keep this humble yet precious jewel shining for the city.

Furthermore, the VCG has been actively involved with the participatory design process for the Vogelmorn Hall and green. VCG is enthused by how the community has been engaged by the process so far. As the community sees the designs

prepared by Co-op Cooperative and Wraight + Associates take shape in concrete form, things will get even more exciting.

The main risk is loss of momentum from lack of clear intent and timeline, with resources being diverted away from the Vogelmorn Precinct.

We therefore support the Vogelmorn steering group submission and its requests that the Council:.

- a) **Approve** the Vogelmorn Precinct Plans (appended to this submission) as developed by Co-op Cooperative and Wraight Associates and the Vogelmorn community through the Vogelmorn Precinct co-design process;
- b) **Provide** support for WCC Officers to enable initial prioritised stages of the Vogelmorn Precinct Plans to be funded by WCC in the next one to two years, preferably with an LTP funding allocation or alternatively from within existing ongoing budgets, so that a staged approach can be implemented (refer attached 'Vogelmorn Precinct Stage 1 Works' dated 15 March 2018);
- c) Agree to a timeline for the full implementation of the Vogelmorn Precinct Plans, ideally much sooner than seems to currently be envisaged by WCC and include funding within the 2018-2028 LTP for the works (refer attached Preliminary Design Cost Estimate dated 20 Feb 2018 with allowance to be made for cost escalation);
- d) **Engage** in discussions about long-term governance for the Vogelmorn Precinct.

Submission on the Wellington City Council's Draft 10 year Plan From Circa Theatre, May 2018

Circa Theatre wholeheartedly supports our Mayor Justin Lester in his vision for a 'Decade of Culture' and the affirmation of Wellington's status as Cultural Capital of New Zealand.

Circa Theatre supports Option 1: Increased levels of service for arts and culture.

We've been a part of Wellington's vibrant cultural landscape since 1976, when the WCC voted to allow Circa Theatre to lease and operate out of the old Ilotts building on the corner of Harris Street and Jervois Quay, at a peppercorn rental. An enduring tribute to Wellington City Council's impact on arts and culture in Wellington.

Circa was an instant hit, presenting high quality, innovative live theatre for a diverse range of local audiences. This was the beginning of a huge growth in new New Zealand work and writers like Roger Hall led the charge to engage with large audiences, putting unique Kiwi experiences on the stage. Over the year's many of New Zealand's leading playwrights have been premiered at Circa, including: Anthony McCarten, Dave Armstrong, Fiona Samuel, Gary Henderson, Lorae Parry, Dean Parker, Pip Hall, and Stuart Hoar, to name but a few.

In 1991 Circa Theatre moved from Harris Street, at the request of the WCC, to its purpose building on the Wellington waterfront. We have recently celebrated Circa's 40th year and entertained our millionth audience member in our new waterfront home.

Circa takes pride in having been a significant voice in establishing Wellington's reputation as New Zealand's home for the arts. And this is because of the dedication of a group professional theatre artists, the Mayor, Councillors and the citizens of Wellington.

Circa has strived to be a resilient and sustainable business over the years, but this has been a struggle as Central Government funding has flowed away to Auckland. Circa has suffered a considerable reduction in CNZ funding. As a leader Toi Totara Haemata in 2010 we were funded at a level about \$700,000 per annum for the theatre and its artists but over time that has reduced to \$580,000 well short of our needs to survive.

That happened because of the current funding formula that CNZ uses: whereby they fund only up to 17% of total income including Local Government, sponsorship and in kind support. The size of the population is also a factor. At that time the Wellington City Council funded Circa at \$50,000 later increased to \$75,000. An amount that is gratefully received but did not help to boost our income to any great degree. Circa has tried to keep ticket prices reasonable and costs down. There have been earthquakes and other challenges for Wellington over the last 15 years but Circa has survived.

Circa has recently signed a partnership agreement with Te Papa to ensure a more resilient model and to develop the opportunities we can do together to build a cultural precinct on the waterfront. It is very exciting to be joined with Te Papa and the opportunity to invest in our future with a new cafe and bar and conference opportunities.

We are also looking to develop opportunities to engage with tourists and offer day time shows and performance.

Circa has now nearly completed it's renovations with the kind support of the Wellington City Council, the Regional Amenities Committee, the Lotteries Grants Board and private donors.

We support Option 1: increased levels of service. Because we believe that all the citizens of the region and the children and young people will thrive if Arts and culture are embraced as an essential part of the makeup of our city

Wellington is a city with a long history of supporting creativity, arts and culture. You could say it is in our DNA. We believe that we must invest in arts and culture and accept our identity as the Capital City and the Cultural Capital of New Zealand. If Circa is granted an opportunity of more funding to pull us into a position of more stability we would be able to pursue the strengthening of our artists and theatre makers in the industry to live and work in Wellington. We would be able to offer our audience diversity and fine performance of new New Zealand work and the best of the world. People will say "we saw that in Wellington" Circa has 2 theatres and is open 6 days a week all year round. You do not need to go to Melbourne or Sydney or London. Wellington can offer it's Citizen's a world class selection of high quality performance art.

Submission to the LTP- Community Performing Arts Trust

We support the general principle of increased funding for the arts and are very happy to see it as a high-level category in the LTP. However we believe the current plan focuses on high-profile artists, acts and venues at the expense of emerging artists (or simply innovative and experimental works by any artists). We think there is an opportunity to go beyond using arts & culture as a branding element for the city, and make a commitment to more diverse, and emerging, artists and work.

We believe it's right to do up the big venues e.g. Town Hall as a city-wide (not just arts) asset. However, wonderful as they are, they don't bear much relation to the grassroots of Wellington performing arts. Venues for entry-level practitioners aren't mentioned in the LTP, nor is support for them generally, as opposed to big prestige acts. But to have a pipeline of high-level talent coming through, you need to have a wide intake of people at the entry point. And support them when they are at a vulnerable stage, where every little bit of money makes a huge difference to capacity, but also self-belief.

Adding \$195,000 to the Arts and Culture Fund over the next 10 years may allow funding of existing contracts to be maintained, but little more. We would like to see more money put into emerging artists, potentially via a separate fund where they are not competing with the established incumbents. Emerging and innovative artists cater for a diversity of audiences that elite acts don't reach, either by content or price.

The Brets, Taikas and Jemaines of tomorrow need nurturing and support today, both with a range of suitable venues to rehearse and perform in, and with support to develop, create and show their work.

1. WHO WE ARE

Compass Health

Compass Health is a Primary Health Organisation with a network of 61 general practices providing quality primary health care services to around 318,000 people across the Wellington, Porirua, Wairarapa, and Kapiti areas. We work in two health alliances: bilaterally with Wairarapa DHB, and multilaterally with Cosine, and Ora Toa PHOs and Capital & Coast DHB.

Compass Health funds or provides a wide range of services in addition to general practice consultations, including: health promotion, Māori health development, Pacific health services, immunisations, specialist sexual health visits, radiology, mental health interventions, podiatry, support for people with long term conditions, and workforce training & development. Our organisation is primarily sector-facing, focused on supporting general practice, enhancing primary care through practice and preventative population health work and advocating for our network partner practices and their patients.

Compass Health is a charitable trust and is overseen by an independent Board of 11 Trustees. The CEO is Martin Hefford, and Chair Dr Larry Jordan.

Regional Public Health (RPH)

RPH is a sub-regional public health service, working with communities across the greater Wellington region through our three District Health Boards, Capital & Coast, Hutt Valley and Wairarapa. As a service we are a part of the Hutt Valley District Health Board. Our business is public health action — working to improve the health and wellbeing of our population and to reduce health disparities. We aim to work with others to promote and protect good health, prevent disease, and improve quality of life across the population. We are funded mainly by the Ministry of Health and we also have contracts with the District Health Boards and other agencies to deliver specific services. We have 130 staff with a diverse range of occupations, including medical officers, public health advisors, health protection officers, public health nurses, analysts and evaluators.

2. GENERAL COMMENTS ON YOUR LONG TERM PLAN

Compass Health and RPH respect and acknowledge that WCC decisions have a significant impact on health. Preventable diseases such as type 2 diabetes are considerable public health issues in our region, and we want to use this as an opportunity to work with you further and build upon our partnership.

We congratulate WCC on the Council's vision for a people-centred city which is well-connected. In particular, your long-term goals of enhancing community connectedness and ensuring that Wellington city is a healthy, vibrant and affordable place to live, align well with our work and we would welcome the opportunity to work with WCC further in achieving this vision.

We commend the Council on addressing some of the challenges faced by the city and the residents of Wellington in this Long Term Plan 2018 -2028 and recognising that not everyone enjoys the same standard of living. Within WCC's priority investment areas, there are significant opportunities for the Council to strengthen this approach by making changes to the environments which shape our health in order to improve health and wellbeing in Wellington City.

For example, we support the Council's priority of creating healthy urban environments by investing in transport in order to maintain easy access around the city and promote alternatives to private cars. We agree that this is a people-focused priority with a wide range of benefits; namely, reduced congestion, improved air quality, better access to local businesses, increased liveability in the Wellington area, increased opportunities for physical exercise and improved quality of life. Improving the cycle network outside of the inner city as part of the Cycling Master Plan for Wellington and creating an integrated network that is safer and easier to use will support this.

We believe improving the health and wellbeing of our communities will have positive impacts on the local economy and community resilience. We are willing to explore the synergies between our work if it is of interest to the Council.

3. WHY WE ARE CONCERNED

Long Term Conditions are a rapidly growing problem in the communities we work with in Wellington. We are particularly concerned about the rapid upsurge in type 2 diabetes¹ in the last few years. Type 2 diabetes is interlinked with the rise in obesity but also can lead to increased risk of stroke, heart disease, vision loss, kidney failure and nerve damage² and the number of people with diabetes in Capital & Coast District Health Board area is increasing every year.³

Using Ministry of Health data, we were able to calculate the overall prevalence of diabetes in our region in 2016.⁴ Over 8% of people aged 55 years to 64 years were estimated to have diabetes in Wellington, rising to 19% of people aged 75 years to 84 years. Additionally, we found marked ethnic disparities in the prevalence of diabetes in Wellington, affecting 8% of Māori adults, 19% of Pacific adults and 5% of European/Other adults.⁵

The New Zealand Health survey shows considerable socioeconomic inequalities in the prevalence of type 2 diabetes in New Zealand, with a significantly higher prevalence of type 2 diabetes in more deprived areas compared with the least deprived areas. This has been noted in our region - low cost primary care practices (practices with low patient fees in areas of greater deprivation and higher numbers of Māori and Pacific) have double the rate of diabetes when compared with other GP practices. These ethnic and socioeconomic inequities in the prevalence of diabetes are concerning, because type 2 diabetes has a major impact on quality of life.

Prevalence of diabetes in Wellington by Census Area Unit




Figure 1 Prevalence of diabetes (all ages) in Wellington by Census Area Unit

Figure 1 shows the prevalence of diabetes by Census Area Unit in Wellington in 2016.8 The data has been ordered into 5 categories (quintiles) which divide the diabetes prevalence figures into equal groups (1-5), with higher number quintiles representing increasing levels of diabetes. The quintiles of prevalence have been compared across area units of the whole Greater Wellington Region, and not just within the Wellington City area. Each quintile contains 20% of the area units within the Greater Wellington Region. For example, Quintile 1 contains the 20% of the area units with the lowest prevalence of diabetes per area unit. Quintile 5 contains the 20% of area units with the highest prevalence of diabetes in the entire region.

The area units with the highest rate of diabetes in Wellington City in decreasing order are Kilbirnie East, Miramar South, Grenada, Maupuia, Newlands, Raroa and Strathmore Park. They are mostly in Wellington City's northern and eastern suburbs.

Why do some communities have higher rates of diabetes?

Type 2 diabetes can be prevented or onset delayed through adopting a healthy lifestyle (e.g nutritious diet, drinking water, and increased physical activity). Weight reduction is particularly effective and reducing levels of obesity will be essential in preventing or delaying the development of type 2 diabetes. 11

The environments which shape our health may be contributing to some of the geographical inequalities in prevalence of type 2 diabetes and other chronic diseases:

- Higher deprivation neighbourhoods are more likely to have a greater number of fast food
 outlets and less access to healthy foods.¹² Neighbourhood density of fast-food outlets and a
 lack of access to healthy foods have been found to be associated with higher rates of type 2
 diabetes and obesity.¹³
- New Zealand-based research has found the most deprived schools to have three times the number of fast-food and convenience stores (within 800 metres) compared with the least deprived schools.¹⁴
- Lack of green space and lower rates of walkability measures are associated with higher rates
 of type 2 diabetes and obesity.^{15,16}
- Lack of access to neighbourhood destinations and street connectivity have been found to be associated with high body mass index (BMI) in New Zealand.¹⁷

Therefore, both the food and built environments can impact on how easy these lifestyle modifications are to make. Wellington City Council has the opportunity to make a meaningful difference in both the food and built environments through its policies and actions.

4. WORKING TOGETHER TO IMPROVE HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Compass Health and RPH recognise and support WCC's previous work on developing and increasing cycle ways, and improving pedestrian walkways. We would like to continue to support you with strategies that will increase physical activity and increase easy access to healthy, affordable food in communities where people live, learn, work and play, including the development of a council healthy food and beverage policy.

Leadership opportunities for Wellington City Council

There are plenty of opportunities for WCC to show leadership in this area in order to make the healthy choice the easy choice:

- Improve access to affordable healthy food and beverage choices by installing water
 fountains in parks and sports grounds of high use and by implementing healthy food and
 beverage policies in council-owned facilities. In the meantime, negotiating food vendor
 contracts that ensure healthy food and beverage options in any new Council facilities (e.g.
 the proposed Movie Museum and Convention Centre), will make adoption of a policy easier.
- Continue to promote physical activity and public transport in Wellington City. This can be supported by implementing good urban design principles. For example, people are more likely to walk when they have access to green space and live close to schools and shops; when streets are well connected; and when neighbourhoods are designed to be walkable and safe. Providing safe spaces for pedestrians and cyclists around the central city as part of the "Let's Get Wellington Moving" programme will help support this. A pro-equity approach could be to extend this programme outside of the central city to Wellington's northern and eastern suburbs.
- Investing in new residential housing developments, redeveloping existing Council housing sites and working towards high-quality intensification of housing, are opportunities to make changes to the environments which shape our health. Complement the Council's efforts to "Get Wellington Moving" by also improving the food environment around these new developments. For instance, incentivising healthy food and beverage retailers to operate in these areas; supporting community gardens, edible landscapes and utilisation of berm gardening; and considering the location of food outlets, markets, and supermarkets with fresh produce in development plans.
- Achieving sustainable growth and planning for the impacts of an increasing population in the Council's review of the Wellington Urban Growth Plan and District Plan can be strengthened by prioritising actions that will increase healthy food and beverage options, particularly in new residential and commercial developments, and by continuing to support actions that will improve conditions for walking, cycling and public transport.

Introduction

- 1. The New Zealand Recreation (NZRA) is a registered charity and the organisation responsible for providing leadership, advocacy and professional development opportunities for those involved in the broader recreation sector. We work at an agency, industry and professional level to build capability, develop partnerships, and equip individuals and organisations with the skills they need to deliver high quality recreation experiences that engage participants.
- 2. The New Zealand Recreation Association's membership includes recreation policy makers, territorial local authorities, voluntary organisations, regional sports trusts, outdoor recreation businesses, and others involved in the delivery of recreation in New Zealand.
- 3. Our role is to champion high-quality recreation for the benefit of New Zealand.
- 4. Our vision is that in 2020 New Zealand has a strong recreation industry that meets the needs of current and future participants, so that through recreation, New Zealanders are active, healthy, and connected
- 5. The New Zealand Recreation Association believes recreation is vital to New Zealand society. Recreation is not just about enjoyment. It is about being healthy, engaged and stimulated, having fun, and interacting with others, whether through outdoor recreation, community recreation, or aquatic and facility-based recreation.
- 6. Recreation is a major contributor to the physical and mental health of individuals, and to the resilience of our communities. 90% of New Zealanders believe being active keeps them physically fit and healthy, and helps relieve stress.

- 7. A thriving recreation industry can also help our nation prosper socially and economically. Sport and active recreation contributes \$4.9 billion or 2.3% to our annual GDP, and the sector employs more than 53,000 New Zealanders. The nation's recreation values and opportunities are fundamental to the nation's tourism industry. Approximately 50% of international visitors to New Zealand participate in one form of outdoor recreation or another.
- 8. Recreation is part of what it is to be a New Zealander. Many of us are members of clubs and groups that enjoy recreation for fun, health and social reasons. 84% of New Zealanders believe sport and physical activity bring people together and create a sense of belonging.
- 9. For individuals, recreation contributes to physical and mental wellbeing and provides an opportunity to meet new people. People define themselves and their communities through their recreation opportunities. Recreation fosters community cohesion and resilience, and supports the integration of diverse ethnic and other social groups. 74% of New Zealanders agree that sport and physical activity help build vibrant and stimulating communities.
- 10. Investment in recreation generates tourism opportunities and supports regional development by encouraging skilled professionals and migrants to consider business options in and beyond the main centres, and in areas which offer quality lifestyle and family options.
- 11. Research shows that recreation makes a significant contribution to social resilience. It allows individuals to thrive, and to connect with each other. This, in turn, makes communities stronger. A society in which people are active and healthy is also more economically sound.
- 12. Physical inactivity is associated with loss of productivity, health costs, as well as associated costs such as pain and suffering. Healthier, happier individuals are more likely to do well in other areas of their lives, whether it is in social or professional situations. This has a positive flow-on effect for communities and society as a whole.
- 13. Greater understanding of these benefits and their downstream impacts, along with awareness of how laws and regulations can influence recreation delivery, are key to ensuring that New Zealand's recreation opportunities remain among the world's best.

Recreation in Wellington

- 14. We acknowledge and thank Wellington City Council as the major provider of our city's sport and recreation facilities. By investing in recreation, Wellington City Council is helping to instil a lasting culture where active living matters. What Wellington City Council does makes a real difference.
- 15. The Wellington City Council has a critical part to play in ensuring people continue to enjoy quality recreation opportunities. These need to be available to everyone, regardless of age, fitness level or socio-economic background.
- 16. Council planning needs to adopt a long-term approach that takes into account factors such as urbanisation, population growth, an ageing population and the rise of tourism, to ensure recreation can continue to thrive amid change.

- 17. Research has found that in areas of activity decline, government and community-led interventions helped reverse the trend. When the infrastructure is in place, people are more likely to be active.
- 18. Population growth and increased demographic diversity, has and will continue to place pressure on recreational infrastructure in Wellington.
- 19. The New Zealand Recreation Association is particularly concerned that the Plan does not make adequate reference to Recreation as a stand-alone subject or pay particular regard to the provision of recreational facilities and services.

Comments on key proposals

- 20. NZRA is supportive of the \$2m Capital Fund set aside to address the impact of significant weather events on parks.
- 21. NZRA is supportive of the \$2.6m expenditure towards supporting Predator Free Wellington. NZRA has made comment on other Councils Long Term Plans that they should make specific reference to the Predator Free 2050 and outline the Councils contributions to that effort. NZRA commends Wellington City Council for doing so and will cite it as an exemplar.
- 22. NZRA is supportive of the addition of land to the Wellington Town Belt and the proposed track connecting Abel Smith Street and Devin Street.
- 23. NZRA is supportive of **Option 1** (Increase levels of service) in the Priority Area of Transport and the prioritisation of work on cycling routes. Investment in Active Transport infrastructure achieves the dual symbiotic benefit of easing traffic congestion and making it easier for residents to integrate healthy recreational activities into their day-to-day lives.
- 24. NZRA notes that according to Sport NZ data, Cycling is the 3rd most popular form of Active Recreation among New Zealand Adults.
- 25. NZRA notes that in other cities, Christchurch being such an example, the number of cyclists on completed cycling routes has exceeded expectations and believes Hamilton City Council should be encouraged by that.

General remarks

- 26. NZRA encourages Wellington City Council to be wary of a recreational workforce shortage and capability gap. NZRA submits that there will be significant challenges in recruiting and retaining appropriately capable staff for new recreational facilities. NZRA encourages Wellington City Council to ensure there is sufficient operational resourcing and workforce development/capability to effectively activate recreation places and spaces.
- 27. NZRA encourages Wellington City Council to undertake playability benchmarking for its Parks and pay particular heed to the detail of park -maintenance contract specifications.

28. NZRA cautions that rapid changes in demographics, participation trends and technology mean that a 'build it and they will come' approach doesn't always work. Simply building and providing recreational infrastructure is not enough. Recreational assets need to be activated and programmed to make them more appealing and to break down barriers for the hard to reach areas of the community.

SUBMISSION TO WELLINGTON CITY COUNCIL PROPOSED 10-YEAR PLAN

Engineering New Zealand is New Zealand's professional body for engineers, with more than 20,000 members - and New Zealand's strongest and most influential voice on engineering issues. You might previously have known us as IPENZ ("Institution of Professional Engineers New Zealand" remains our legal name).

We are submitting on the 10-Year Plan to endorse the priority given to resilience and to encourage more thinking about adaptation. We are part of this city – our national office is in Wellington – and know how important it is to reduce Wellington's vulnerability.

Page 10 - We would like to see the resilience priority more clearly represented in the vision for the city.

Page 14 - We agree that increasing water storage and improving reservoirs is vital to ensure security of supply. Drought and other events make the city vulnerable if there is insufficient additional storage capacity. We consider that wastewater systems need to be in place prior to population growth if we are to protect the natural environment. Planned infrastructure investment to enable growth can minimise cost and disruption.

Page 16 - We welcome the proposal for accelerometers. However, we note that what is also required is the engineering expertise to interpret the data and to respond in the event of an earthquake. We want to offer our support in this area, in partnership with our technical societies, including the Structural Engineering Society of New Zealand (SESOC) and the New Zealand Society for Earthquake Engineering (NZSEE). We support additional funding to secure unreinforced masonry in heritage buildings.

Page 30 - We agree that resilience of the transport corridor requires investment in strengthening retaining walls, tunnels and bridges. We consider that there is a need for a clear, big picture strategy for transport connecting the Let's Get Wellington Moving programme, urban design and land use to a long term vision for the City. The Wellington Urban Growth Plan review needs to fill that gap.

Page 48 - We note that the Infrastructure Strategy appears to be for the minimum required period of 30 years. This runs the risk that it may not take sufficient account of the potential impact of more severe storm events, more intense rainfall and sea-level rise linked to climate change.

We would like to see integration of the 2017 Resilience Strategy into the 10-Year Plan and a 50 year Infrastructure Strategy. Two key areas that merit more consideration are a future Adaptation Plan, and, water sensitive design as part of an integrated approach to stormwater.

We would like to take the opportunity to speak to this submission.

We would first like to remind you that in 2015, Council consulted on housing choice in the Khandallah area. Over 80% of residents of the nearly 500 who made a submission opposed medium density housing or were neutral to it. https://wellington.govt.nz/your-council/projects/housing-choice-andsupply/khandallah/consultation-feedback. In September 2016, Council voted to put any discussion of medium density housing on hold in our area until they could consult further with us. https://wellington.govt.nz/your-council/projects/housing-choice-and-supply/khandallah/khandallah-as-amedium-density-housing-area. However, it seems that Council has overridden the desires of our community and has gone ahead with allowing medium density housing in Khandallah and in our adjacent suburb of Broadmeadows. This has caused a great deal of angst amongst residents who are feeling that Council is disenfranchising them. This is a real concern as it seems that Council says one thing but acts in a different manner. This does not engender trust in both Councillors and officials. Assumptions Population forecast: The Housing strategy is based on a number of assumptions and we are concerned that these are not robust. The first assumption is that by 2043 the population of Wellington will be up to 280,000 people and 30,000 housing units will be needed to accommodate this huge number of new people. However, Council % Ûas own projections on your website state the population for Wellington, currently estimated at 212,000 would be 250,000 people which would mean that 20,000 new housing units would be needed. We note that this detail is buried deep in the report. Has Council accurately gauged the drivers for population growth given the huge range in its population forecast, with an important driver, immigration likely to be more controlled? We think this forecast needs to be revised. Consultation with the community: We note in the 2015-2025 Ten Year Plan that engagement with the community was very prominent. We couldn‰ûªt find it at all in the 2018 plan. We are concerned that Council pays lip service to listening to the community and that many decisions are made before consultation over an issue begins. We believe that engagement with the community should be authentic, not tick the box. This includes consulting the community at the design stage of a project, rather than letting officials lead the decision-making. Billion Dollar Spend-Up: We note that in the 2015 plan, council debt was capped at a maximum of 175% of annual income ‰ÛÒ the same as a household earning \$50,000 a year having a mortgage of \$87,500 (p.13). We understand this is conservative but we are concerned that Council is ignoring this financially prudent policy. We do not want Wellington to be in the same position as Dunedin which nearly went bankrupt in 2011. WCC has a AA Standard and Poor's rating which is good. But more than doubling the debt per resident over 10 years seems a lot. Especially if there isn't quite the expected population growth to share the burden. Ultimately the ratepayers will be paying dearly for this ‰ÛÒ especially if the population forecasts are incorrect. Many of our members are concerned about the doubling of borrowings and debt and that this will result in a huge debt repayment and interest charges for ratepayers. Giving our land away cheap to developers: Whilst we agree that we need more affordable housing for renters and first owners, we are concerned that Council will be giving our land away to developers. We believe there are other macroeconomic tools that can be used to slow the meteoric rise in house prices. The affordable houses for first home owners will only be affordable for those people lucky enough to be a first home buyer and after that the price will be determined by the market. Meanwhile developers get richer and Wellington Council is stripped of much of its land. We would like any decision to sell Council owned land to be transparent and notified. We also note the huge developments proceeding within Wellington %Û s boundaries that are projected to release 1,800-2,000 sections annually. We note the increasing cost of building exacerbated by the shortage of builders and the ever-increasing cost of building materials and council charges. Voiding Due Process and the Right to be heard: We are most concerned of Council‰ûas intention to further fast track resource consents in order to build more units faster. We note that this is to happen in the Special Housing Area but we think, given the track record of unnotified consents and %û÷less than minor%û impacts in all neighbourhoods, that Council is once again being disingenuous and ignoring the rights of the people who live in these areas. This policy is essentially to permit wholesale and across the Board non-notified consents which it would only be a matter of time that they are applied across all neighbourhoods. Some of our members believe the council should require all developers to pay 100% of the infrastructure costs when applying for Resource Consent and Building Permits. We understand the need to attract developers to build in Wellington, but judging by the amount of building currently going on, that does not seem to be a problem. We do not think it is the correct that ratepayers should subsidise developers. We believe that residents in existing neighbourhoods have the right to have the amenity, character, security, privacy and parking not impacted by new housing. Any new build should improve urban design outcomes not take away from them.

Furthermore, any new build should take into account existing infrastructure, wastewater and other infrastructure needs such as adequate parking. We are concerned that the Council often deviates from the District Plan as it gives no surety to residents. We believe there should be transparent and accountable decisions made regarding resource consents, and given technology, this should not hold up decision making. We would be interested in legislation to over-rule case law which at the moment gives very little weight to resident $\hat{\mathbb{Q}}$ rights. An example of this are apartment complexes approved in Taranaki Street with parking for less than 10% of the complex and in Wigan Street where no on-site parking is available so residents need to park on the street. Highrises throughout Wellington: We note that Council intends to further intensify Wellington City and envisions 80 new high rises in Wellington to accommodate the forecast of 280,000 people. Given that Wellington lies on a fault line, given that climate change will in 100 years start to affect the sea levels in the harbour, we wonder if it is a good idea to allow such intensification in such a vulnerable area. Wouldn‰Ûªt it be better to keep the population to a certain level in Wellington and encourage housing development north and west of Wellington including in the Tawa and Grenada Village areas. Affordable Housing vs Social Housing: We believe that everyone deserves a safe, long term home over their heads and the opportunity to own their own home if at all possible. It is sad to think our children \$\tilde{U}^2\$ generation will never be able to own a house except for those who are wealthy, inherit or who are saddled with astronomic mortgages for life. We know this is a huge issue and Council %Û s housing strategy is trying to tackle it and we applaud them for this. We think caution is called for as more housing is created by developers for rental ‰ÛÒ what is to stop them from offering market rents which is

Dependence on private motor carsWhile electric cars will go some way to reducing our carbon emissions, with NZ‰Ûas averagevehicle life of 14 years, fossil fuelled vehicles are likely to be in the majority for the life of thisplan. In any case, private motor cars, whether fossil fuelled or electric, create congestion, require space for storage, and encourage unhealthy lifestyles. We need to reduce ourdependence on the private motor car, by providing good active and public transport options, and not subsidising the use of cars. We need to recognise that on street parking has a cost, particularly the opportunity cost if parking prevents road space being used for traffic. Free onstreet parking is effectively a subsidy of car use. Parking policy should work towardsreducing the supply of parking in CBD, particularly on arterial routes such as ThorndonQuay, where the road space is required for traffic flow, in particular protected cycleways. However experience in Holland indicates that oldereBikers, particularly men, have a slightly higher crash rate. We need to ensure thatolder bikers, particularly those taking up biking after some time, get support andtraining in using their bikes safely. To sum up, eBikes offer an opportunity to address many of our transport issues, and theiruse should be encouraged, but this needs to be planned for.

We believe that the Airport Runway Extension is one large-scale project that should be deferred. Youth Council is not supportive of an airport runway extension without new major arguments in its favour. Frankly, we are unsure why it has been included in this plan. The airport runway extension has been argued extensively for and against throughout the past three years. It seems clear to us that currently there is not the mood within the population for it to happen. If Council pushes through with plans in this area it will do nothing more than erode the goodwill it has with the public. The project has a large price tag attached that could be better spent elsewhere. Treasury estimates put this project in the half a billion-dollar range, and airlines have said they will not fly international long haul to Wellington anyway. Moreover, current legal proceedings have significantly delayed the project $\hat{\omega}\hat{U}\hat{O}$ perhaps indefinitely. If spending decisions come down to the airport runway extension or more funds for housing and other areas, we support the deferment of the airport project. The community should play a major part in this review, as the District Plan has often been the point of contention between Council and residents, who are not happy with certain developments that are allowed under the current District Plan. This option proposes that Council accelerate work on a reviewed District Plan (that Youth Council has commented on above), and a Wellington Urban Growth Plan review. This option also proposes a new streamlined consents process, alongside the construction of dual-purpose Movie Museum and Convention Centre.In supporting Option 1, Youth Council does not support Option 2, which is to remain with the status quo, with no additional expenditure but

- 32. Youth Council endorses Council's dedication in finding ways to decrease carbon emissions within the transport area, but note our concerns above within the Resilience and environment section that more needs to be done.

Sustainable growth

District Plan and Wellington Urban Growth Plan review

- 33. Youth Council supports Option 1 contained in the Sustainable growth section of the LTP consultation document. This option proposes that Council accelerate work on a reviewed District Plan (that Youth Council has commented on above), and a Wellington Urban Growth Plan review. This option also proposes a new streamlined consents process, alongside the construction of dual-purpose Movie Museum and Convention Centre.
- 34. In supporting Option 1, Youth Council does not support Option 2, which is to remain with the status quo, with no additional expenditure but missing out on any benefits of the above proposals.
- 35. Youth Council strongly supports reviewing both the District Plan (noted above) and the accelerated Wellington Urban Growth Plan. These Plans are essential to properly planning Wellington's future. We recognise that the growth predictions for the city have changed drastically since the last review and that a renewed plan is necessary to address increase growth.
- 36. We urge Council to consider a larger number of possible growth prediction in their review analysis for these plans, to ensure we don't again find in three years' time that our growth estimates have been significantly under planned.

Streamlining the consents and compliance process

- 37. Youth Council supports Council streamlining the consenting process. Consents and compliance is a major area where many of the public interact with Council. As a result, their experience dealing with Council during the consents process is a major factor in determining their overall perception of Council. Stress-free and consumer-focused consents and compliance processes will increase the overall goodwill that the public has for Council.
- 38. Youth Council also recognises the importance of easier consent processes to lower building costs and in turn increase overall affordable housing supply. Streamlining should occur for large developments and smaller projects such as additions and alterations or business refurbishments.
- 39. Youth Council also supports a streamlined consents process regardless of what option is agreed to under the Sustainable growth area.

Movie Museum and Convention Centre

- 40. Youth Council has mixed views on the Movie Museum and Convention Centre proposal. Ultimately, Youth Council has voted to support the proposal. The Movie Museum will provide a boost to tourism for Wellington and attract greater tourist spending. It shows off our strengths in the film sector and complements our current attractions.
- 41. However, the Movie Museum and Convention Centre will require a large amount of capital expenditure, which some Youth Councillors feel can be better spent elsewhere.

Other proposals

- 42. Youth Council supports expanding Kiwi Point Quarry. We have independently submitted on this issue already and will do so again. Further details can be found in our previous submission.
- 43. Youth Council also broadly supports the idea of funding economic and tourism initiatives. However, given the high-level details provided in the LTP consultation document, Youth Council cannot comment more until specifics are released.

Arts and culture

Indoor arena proposal

- 44. Youth Council fully supports the indoor arena proposal. Youth Council considers there to be no sense to refer to ourselves as the 'culture Capital' when we have no way to attract big acts to the city. Assuming that the economic case for such an arena is sound we expect that an indoor arena will fill a big gap in the city.
- 45. Youth Council strongly encourages Council to prioritise the indoor area proposal as a matter of importance, shifting funding for this project into Years 1-3 of the LTP. Wellington continues to miss almost all large events that instead travel to Auckland, Christchurch, and Dunedin. Council must act now to ensure we don't fall further behind than we already have.

Making Wellington a child and youth friendly city

46. Youth Council fully supports Council's work to become a child friendly city, and their focus on promoting child friendly events. However, we also ask Council to consider more events for older young people (aged 13-17) that aren't late at night or are alcohol/R18 events.

Earthquake strengthening

- 47. Youth Council asks that Council consider undertaking earthquake strengthening of amenities such as zoos and pools during school term times to reduce the effect on young people of having parts of these amenities out of operation.
- 48. Youth Council has a mixed view on the priority of earthquake strengthening the Museum of Wellington City & Sea, given it does not attract a wide market, especially in youth and children.
- 49. Given the possible legal necessity to earthquake strengthen the Museum, Youth Council asks Council to consider and communicate the prioritisation of funding for this proposal.

Performance/space fees during earthquake strengthening

- 50. Youth Council urges Council to reduce fees payable for the Michael Fowler Centre during the next two years when the Town Hall and the St James Theatre are being earthquake strengthened.
- 51. This would encourage artists to still look at Wellington as a viable performance venue and also encourage more youth shows to occur due to cheaper fees. This policy looks to mostly offset a potential drop in revenue due to higher fees and scare space.

Other proposals

- 52. Youth Council fully supports funding for events such as Matariki and Kia Mau.
- 53. Youth Council encourages more youth engagement with Te Whare Hēra so that there is a direct benefit to the community, and that the community feels involved.

54. Youth Council supports more funding for small groups and community groups, for venues and resources. We also support analysis of where this money will come from.

Conclusion

- 55. Youth Council is broadly supportive of the draft Long Term Plan 2018-2028. We are encouraged by the forward focus of Wellington City Council, but are also concerned that this LTP appears cautious and unambitious.
- 56. Young people are increasingly interested in Council business, though they often may not realise it:
 - a. Transport planning has large effects on how young people navigate their daily lives, while housing planning dictates where new options to live will be located, and how much these may cost.
 - b. Sustainable growth looks to the future and signposts where growth will occur so we can be prepared for change. At the same time, resilience and the environment are critical to Wellington's ability to survive both in times of natural disaster and throughout looming monumental changes as a result of climate change.
 - c. Arts and culture are at the heart of what Wellington is proudly renowned for. In continuing to position Wellington as the creative capital of New Zealand, support is necessary for both emerging and established artists, performances, and exhibitors.
- 57. Youth Council endorses a mix of capital spending on assets and operational spending on services throughout the LTP. In working to strike a fair balance and manage funding over the life of the LTP, Youth Council has also asked for some projects to be delayed or deferred so that other projects may be funded.
- 58. Given the need to manage Wellington's budget with the utmost care, Youth Council urges Council to carefully consider what Wellington's priorities should be, and having done so, make sure to fund them to the right levels to ensure meaningful change.

Comments

Over the last four years, Capital BMX has worked in partnership with our council to build and maintain an UCI, international standard BMX track. We have worked hard and well together, transforming a neglected and disused public reserve into a great recreational and sporting facility that is used by the residents of Wellington, and the greater Wellington Region. Since completing the construction of the track in February 2016 and, in particular, asphalting the berms on February 2017, the track has experienced very high levels of use from both competitive BMX riders and from recreational riders and our Wellington public. Since completion in February 2016, the per annum cost to maintain the track has been approximately \$15,000-17,500. The primary costs have included:- the purchase of lime (which is used at the surface material on the track),- polymer (which is used to harden and stabilise the lime to reduce the effects of rain, rider wear and tear, and to suppress dust), - contractors (for specialist works that capital BMX has not been able to carry out),- fuel for two (modified) quad bikes Capital BMX uses to roll the track, and- the repair and maintenance of equipment. Over the next three years, Capital BMX expects that the costs to maintain the track will reduce due to the progressive building up of the depth of lime on the track and its maturing, our improved track maintenance knowledge and methodologies, and the acquiring of further specialist track maintenance equipment. Excluding costs that may be incurred to repair the track following any extreme weather event, Capital BMX estimates that it will incur track maintenance costs in each of the financial years in the period 1/7/2018 to 30/6/2021 of \$10,000 to \$12,500. Capital BMX's submission will be for a contribution from the Wellington City Council towards the cost of maintaining the track of \$7,000 per financial year in the period 1/7/2018 to 60/6/2021. Capital BMX also wishes to construct a roof structure over the start gate mechanism at the track to both enhance the facility and to reduce the noise from the start gate and thereby reduce any adverse impact on neighbouring residents. Capital BMX's submission will be for a contribution of 25% from the Wellington City Council towards the design and construction of the start gate roof structure (capped at a total contribution of \$10,000). Our submission will be for an immediate contribution from the Wellington City Council of \$5,000 to enable Capital BMX to engage an engineer to design and prepare plans for the roof structure. Further detail on this funding bid is contained in the attachment.

Wellington City Long Term Plan 2018 - 2028

Submission by the Porirua Harbour and Catchment Community Trust

The Trust notes that:

One of the outcomes of the LTP is:

"Developing Wellington as an eco-city means proactively responding to environmental challenges. It is important that Wellington takes an environmental leadership role as the capital city of a clean and green New Zealand." (p 10);

One of the priority investment areas is resilience and environment (p 11);

And a priority area is to:

Upgrade stormwater infrastructure in the city to better deal with adverse weather events (to reduce flooding events) (p 13).

Some \$13 million is assigned to *increase network capacity in other parts of the network.* (p 14).

We support this layered approach and assume it will apply to existing and, especially future development in the part of the city that extends into the catchment of Te-Awarua-o-Porirua. One of the proposals mentioned in the plan is an improved level of service for stormwater infrastructure in Tawa (p 50).

However, we note that no mention is made of the type of water management system that the investment will provide for.

1 We submit that the plan should state and give priority for all future water investment to Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD).

The Council has expertise in this area. It needs to be explicitly applied through the Long Term Plan. In doing so, more environmentally and ecologically positive mechanisms such as the use of swales, run off absorption areas and, where appropriate, wetlands, will deliver cost effective, environmentally and visually positive results that add to amenity values.

On page 33 there is a proposal to undertake *a comprehensive review of the City's Urban Growth Plan and District Plan.*

We submit that this work should include a commitment to Water Sensitive Urban Design and this should be explicit in the Long Term Plan.

On page 48 the *responding to growth* section mentions further greenfield growth to the north of the city. We assume this includes areas such as Stebbings Valley.

Resilience Infrastructure %ÛÒ Major Roadworks Projects (Wellington Water)By the end of 2018, and for at least the next 4 years, Mt Cook will be hit by major construction and roadworks. The area around Wallace Street, Hargreaves Street and Rolleston Street will be most impacted. The works are the new reservoir pipeline (12 %ÛÒ 15 months), the Housing New Zealand redevelopment of its site between Hargreaves Street and Rolleston Street (which will demolish and re-build what is currently 54 units on a large site), and the 35,000m3 new Prince of Wales Om€ roro Reservoir. A replacement Bell Road reservoir will also be constructed during this time, which will impact on Brooklyn Road, Bell Road and the top of Bidwill Street. These are all major projects. Wallace Street is already very congested much of the time and will be single-lane in parts as the reservoir pipeline is laid. During the reservoir construction some provision has been made for replacement temporary car parking for Rolleston Street residents. During the pipeline work, Wallace Street and Hargreaves Street will lose 8 ‰ÛÒ 10 car parks as the pipeline work is completed in 50m sections over 12 ‰ÛÒ 15 months. Given the level of upheaval and inconvenience that will be experienced by the Mt Cook community, we would like to request that the Wallace Street Pipeline team negotiate 10 additional temporary car parks that can be utilised during this work, as each section of the road is impacted. A suggestion was made at the public meeting that the designation of the upper Prince of Wales field be brought forward to allow for some temporary parking there. Other options were suggested.Mt Cook Mobilised is happy to work with the Project Community Liaison person to make this work, once the temporary car parking has been identified. The provision of temporary car parks will be

appreciated and will, in part, relieve the stress which we anticipate residents will suffer over this prolonged period. This submission has been prepared on behalf of Mt Cook Mobilised, a group which represents residents of Mt Cook. Mt Cook Mobilised formed in 2007, and is affiliated to the Newtown Residents Association (incorporated in 1963).

Mt Cook is a diverse suburb located between Te Aro and Newtown. Mt Cook is home to Massey University's Wellington Campus, Wellington High School, and borders the Basin Reserve. Mt Cook School is the local primary, and the suburb has connections to the schools that surround the Basin. The Wellington Regional Hospital and Te Whaea - the New Zealand Dance School and Toi Whakaari - at the northern end of Newtown are readily accessed from Mt Cook. In 2015 Pukeahu National War Memorial Park opened on Buckle Street, Mt Cook. The population of Mt Cook includes a strong social housing presence and numerous students. In the last ten years apartment blocks have become more prominent in Mt Cook. Much of the housing stock is wooden houses, including pre-1900 and early twentieth century styles – this is not surprisingly as Mt Cook is one of the city's oldest suburbs. The residents of Mt Cook are proud to be well represented amongst the city's walking and cycling commuters.

Resilience Infrastructure - Major Roadworks Projects (Wellington Water)

By the end of 2018, and for at least the next 4 years, Mt Cook will be hit by major construction and roadworks. The area around Wallace Street, Hargreaves Street and Rolleston Street will be most impacted. The works are the new reservoir pipeline (12 – 15 months), the Housing New Zealand redevelopment of its site between Hargreaves Street and Rolleston Street (which will demolish and re-build what is currently 54 units on a large site), and the 35,000m³ new Prince of Wales Omāroro Reservoir. A replacement Bell Road reservoir will also be constructed during this time, which will impact on Brooklyn Road, Bell Road and the top of Bidwill Street.

These are all major projects. Wallace Street is already very congested much of the time and will be single-lane in parts as the reservoir pipeline is laid.

During the reservoir construction some provision has been made for replacement temporary car parking for Rolleston Street residents.

During the pipeline work, Wallace Street and Hargreaves Street will lose 8 - 10 car parks as the pipeline work is completed in 50m sections over 12 - 15 months.

Given the level of upheaval and inconvenience that will be experienced by the Mt Cook community, we would like to request that the Wallace Street Pipeline team negotiate 10 additional temporary car parks that can be utilised during this work, as each section of the road is impacted. A suggestion was made at the public meeting that the designation of the upper Prince of Wales field be brought forward to allow for some temporary parking there. Other options were suggested.

Mt Cook Mobilised is happy to work with the Project Community Liaison person to make this work, once the temporary car parking has been identified. The provision of temporary car parks will be appreciated and will, in part, relieve the stress which we anticipate residents will suffer over this prolonged period.

Tasman Street is becoming another well-used short-cut to the south. Tasman Street was a very quiet street with heritage housing stock.

Submission to Wellington City Council on the 2018-2028 Long Term Plan From Worser Bay Boating Club

15 May 2018

The members of Worser Bay Boating Club support the general direction of the Wellington City Council 2018 – 2028 long term plan and specifically support the provision of funding for resilience works associated with the Worser Bay Bating Club rebuild project.

RATIONALE:

Worser Bay Boating Club and Wellington City Council have been working together for the past four years to plan the construction of a new facility at Worser Bay. The previous 60-year-old building was earthquake prone, no longer complied with parts of the building code and was increasingly susceptible to storm damage as sea level rise starts to impact on Wellington City.

Construction has just begun on a new facility with work set to commence on the land works once the long-term plan has been ratified.

The new facility will house the Worser Bay Boating Club and the Boat & Beach Wise Education Centre.

One of the purposes of the building will to be the clubrooms for Worser Bay Boating Club. The modern self-catering kitchen and flexible hall and meeting spaces will be available for use by other community groups and by the businesses and individuals that support the club's schools and youth programmes. The capacity for boat storage will increase in the new building meaning the club will be able to cater to the increasing demand for this service as Wellington's population continues to grow.

The new building includes state of the art facilities designed to support youth sailors from Central New Zealand to stay active in the sport of sailing and succeed on the international stage. The Central New Zealand youth sailing hub will be based in the building. The hub is a collaboration with Yachting New Zealand that is designed to provide a mixture of sport science and coaching support to help young sailors bridge the gap from junior sailing to lifelong sailing.

The building and surrounding site works include a series of spaces that schools from the greater Wellington region can use to help keep kiwi kids safe and active in and around the sea. This includes spaces for a penguin hotel, paua nursery, snorkelling trail and anemone garden. Local school kids are involved in establishing these aspects of the Boat & Beach Wise Centre and will be responsible for monitoring their success in improving marine biodiversity into the future.

The Boat & Beach Wise Centre will include an inside 'wet' classroom and an outdoors 'dune' classroom in which Wellington school kids will be taught water skills for life while developing an understanding of how to restore and look after coastal ecosystems. A charitable trust called the Boat & Beach Wise Trust

has been established to oversee the development of the schools and youth programmes and to find business and philanthropic support for their implementation.

The Wellington City Council is well advanced with plans for the site works around the new building which includes a new boat ramp, a raised rigging area, extended rescue boat breastwork and rock revetment around the carparking area. All this work has been consented and is ready to commence once the funding is confirmed in the long-term plan.

Work began on the project in April 2018 and is planned to be completed for the start of summer 2019.

Thoughts on WCC's Draft Ten Year Plan Consultation Document

- 1. Far too much fluff. Clichés everywhere.
- 2. Five areas identified for priority spending over the next ten years:
 - 1. Resilience and Environment
 - 2. Housing
 - 3. Transport
 - 4. Sustainable Growth
 - 5. Arts and Culture
- 3. I do not think this framework is well-defined. It does not convey a strategy that convinces me that the Council has a sound vision for Wellington. Karori and Makara are almost totally neglected. Infrastructure is very badly dealt with. I am dubious about the concept of a "growth corridor" from Johnsonville to the airport. The reality is that the older inner ring of suburbs has been long neglected by Council, and much infrastructure needs upgrading or renewal. Streetscapes are unattractive, and some ugly buildings by developers are still being consented.

The failure of Council to pursue the undergrounding of services in these older suburbs is creating many "third world vistas" of ugly wires clustered on poles.

- 4. The city is *first and foremost* **our people**. While the housing and transport sections in the draft plan are related to people, the picture painted in the plan seems to me to be incomplete in respect of **our people**.
- 5. I would like to see the draft plan revised with ten areas discussed for priority spending:
 - 1. <u>Where We Live</u>: the CBD, "old" suburbs, and new developments; planning, standards, parking, streetscapes, shopping, access to transport and leisure, schools, health services, emphasising the concept of balanced communities.
 - 2. <u>Where We Work</u>: Industrial and Commercial areas space and facilities and infrastructure for employment. Encouragement of employment within or close to where people live.
 - 3. <u>Moving Around Our City and Region</u>: local distributive transport, rapid transit, state highways, pedestrian and cycleways, parking, public transport, including resilience.
 - 4. <u>Our Leisure</u>: Parks and Reserves, Arts and Culture, Shopping, Cafes, Restaurants, and Bars, Coastal Access and Facilities
 - 5. <u>Education and Training</u>: schools at all levels, spatial locations and facilities including transport.
 - 6. *Health and Public Services*: adequacy, location, accessibility.
 - 7. <u>Our Environment</u>: clean water, clean air, clean coastal strips, predator and weed control, safety and security and emergency management.
 - 8. *Electricity, Telecommunications, Three Waters*: facilities and operations, renewal and upgrades of old infrastructure, resilience.
 - 9. <u>Encouraging Our Economy</u>: provision of infrastructure, good Town Plan, sensible marketing of the city.
 - 10. <u>Our Interaction with Our Neighbouring Cities, Our Region, and Central Government</u>: Encourage better spatial planning of (for example) major retail developments, parks and reserves, major sports facilities, etc. Develop better communication and co-ordination with central government agencies to avoid (for example) fiascos like the Basin Reserve flyover plan. Develop a strategy for advocating for central government funded facilities that are needed by our people such as schools.

The Wellington Rugby Football Union (WRFU), in submitting on the Wellington City Council's (WCC) Long Term Plan (2018-2028) Consultation Document, wish to make comment in the following areas:

- Firstly, the WRFU commends the level of investment by the WCC in recreational facilities in the last ten
 years; in particular the artificial turf fields programme, which the WRFU believe is essential to achieving
 greater accessibility for sport and recreation in the city, and thereby contributing to the health and
 wellbeing of Wellington communities.
- The WRFU has eight affiliated member clubs within the WCC catchment, which provides for over 3,500
 registered junior and senior players; as such the importance of maintaining not only artificial turf but also
 natural turf playing fields for the ongoing sustainability of these clubs is vital to the communities that they
 continue to operate in.
- The WRFU acknowledge and accept the proposed increases for sports field fees and charges and the proposed integration of artificial turf with natural turf, in terms of the operating costs model.
- However, the WRFU wish to emphasise the importance of maintaining consistent service provision to all fields and in this regard, making available the appropriate Service Level Agreements to the WRFU.
- The WRFU believe it is vitally important that all community assets for sport are able to be optimised for the benefit of all Wellingtonians.
- The iconic Basin Reserve is one such venue that must continue to be available to our communities year round.
- The WRFU, whilst acknowledging the ability for junior rugby to be played on the outfield at the Basin over the last two seasons, stress the importance of finding solutions to accommodate senior rugby through this period.
- Furthermore, outside of Westpac Stadium, the Basin Reserve is the only sporting facility with appropriate seating capacity in Wellington city with the potential to host senior representative rugby.

The WRFU would welcome further opportunity to discuss this and present orally to Councillors.

I think Council has to balance out some of its Transport ideas, far too much emphasis is being placed on cycling in the inner city, this is not for everyone, people of all ages will still need to rely on other means of transport in the city; bus, lightrail or private cars. Instead of buying loads of bigger buses, there should be smaller buses to traverse the hillier sections of roads around the city. Trams ran in Wellington and suburban streets despite those streets being narrow. Manchester and Nottingham in the UK are good prime examples of how light rail works. Manchester in particular, where trains come in from outlaying areas, continue on through the stations and out into the city where they effectively become trams. This is a submission on the Long term plan.

I strongly oppose:

The Council paying \$10 million for infrastructure for the Shelly Bay Development.

The Council paying one cent more than the capped amount of \$10Million dollars.

The Council paying for infrastructure for the Peninsula, at least not until the Council is open and transparent about what this is for, specifically, is this infrastructure only for Shelly Bay or is there a wider plan yet that we do not have details of? Please Councillors, ask questions and represent the community.

\$10 Million for infrastructure for Shelly Bay.

The Council is paying costs that the Developer should have to pay and it is a direct subsidy of ratepayers to the Developer.

I do not think any other developers in Wellington have ever received such a great deal. The Council capped its contribution to \$10 million, I still think that it is not right and that Councillors should vote NO to the \$10 million for Shelly Bay and make the Developer pay its own way.

Paying more than the cap.

The cap did not last long! The amount that ratepayers will pay has increased already. The draft plan gives the developer another \$2.2 million "to facilitate the development at Shelly Bay, an upgrade to the transport network from the Miramar Cutting through to Shelly Bay is required. Our contribution toward uplifting the existing road is \$2.2 million in year 4 of the plan."

If the \$2.2 million is included in the capped \$10 million then please clarify the plan, but if I am right... you are going over the cap. Councillors, how has this got past you? Why is this not transparent? How has this happened?

The report for 27th September 2017 said that the cost of upgrading Shelly Bay Road was included the \$20 million (that was being met 50:50).

Specifically, it is proposed that Council fund \$3.35 million in public realm works (50% of the total estimated cost of \$6.7 million) for the development, comprising a village green, the road relocated behind the green enhancing better public access to the water's edge, two waterfront "point parks" located at each end of the development, and other street scape works within the development area (all to remain in Council ownership).

It is proposed that Council fund \$6.5 million in infrastructure works (50% of the total estimated cost of \$13 million) made up primarily of upgrades to Shelly Bay Road and the Miramar Avenue intersection, water supply, storm water and waste water upgrades. The residual 50% of public realm and infrastructure costs would be met by Shelly Bay Limited.

The report said that \$1.21 million was included in the \$20 million for the 'base case' (which is the 6 metre wide carriageway and 1.5 m wide crushed lime path, that would not be appropriate for cycling).

Is the Council paying for the Shelly Bay Road twice? Is it paying for 50% of \$1.21 million plus \$2.2 million?

Everyone who made a submission on cycling would agree that something more than a crushed lime path was needed. Council staff say 'would not be appropriate for cycling.'

Why does the ratepayer have to pay? Every other Developer pays the costs of the flow on impacts of their development. What is it about this Developer/ Development that makes this Council want to be so free with ratepayer money? Shouldn't the Polluter Pays Principle not apply here?

Councillors should ask the question - if it was not for the proposed Development would we be spending money on Shelly Bay Road?

There would be usual repair work, like other places on the Peninsula, but would you be spending nearly \$2.8M on Shelly Bay Road?

Other infrastructure .

There are other projects for the Miramar Peninsula in the draft. They total \$11.3 million (with the \$10 million plus \$2.2 million it totals \$22.5 million!)

Councillors you need to scrutinise all the numbers in the budget for the Miramar Peninsula and give the public the answers to the following:

- 1 What are the water improvement projects \$4.5 MILLION??
- 2 What are the waste water improvements projects \$3.4MILLION??
- 3 What storm water improvements projects \$3.4MILLION??

Why are these projects needed? Would you be doing them if it wasn't for Shelly Bay?

Are you doing these works because you have plans for the Prison site and the Defence land to be developed? Ask questions and listen to the community!

You are elected to represent all Wellingtonians not just a few. This needs direct questions and transparency with what is planned.

Stop subsidising the Shelly Bay Development and be open and forth coming about what you are planning on the Peninsula. This affects all of us, and you represent us.

I would like come to a hearing and present this submission.

WELLINGTON CITY COUNCIL LONG TERM PLAN (WCC LTP) 2018-2028

OraTaiao: The New Zealand Climate and Health Council is submitting in response to Wellington City Council (WCC)'s Long Term Plan 2018-2028 public consultation¹.

Our 5 main messages are:

- 1. Adopt the **UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)**² as **WCC's framework** for long-term planning (including **closing the growing wealth gap** in this city)
- Apply WREMO's #1 resilience priority: RISK REDUCTION. This LTP must rapidly reduce climate risk by getting our city's climate-damaging emissions on track to net zero well before 2050
- 3. Integrate strong climate action across all 5 WCC priority areas and take strong climate control of Let's Get Welly Moving (LGWM) transport planning
- 4. Stop high-emissions infrastructure investment especially airport runway extension
- 5. Urgently update WCC's Low Carbon Plan 2016-2018 this year:
 - set strong targets towards net zero capital city well before 2050 to limit warming to
 2'C, and pursue efforts towards 1.5'C net zero in 2030s
 - o report on our city's latest emissions progress (last report data 2014/15)
 - o monitor international aviation and shipping emissions risk
 - o include realistic emissions costs in all WCC analysis

Climate context for Wellington city:

- New Zealand has signed up to meeting the 17 interlinked UN Sustainable Development Goals (Fig. 1). The vision is sustainable development for better wellbeing and equity. Each goal has a set of targets; needing central and local government, institutional, community and business action.
- It is time for WCC to identify actions our capital city can take (including in partnership with others) and make sustainable development the focus of this long term plan.

- As well as limiting global warming well below 2'C³, NZ has also committed to: "pursue efforts to limit the (global average) temperature increase to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels, recognizing that this would significantly reduce the risks and impacts of climate change".
- NZ has a special responsibility to the Pacific as citizens, family and neighbours, where warming beyond 1.5°C will render homelands uninhabitable.
- Limiting warming to 1.5°C currently requires global zero net emissions "well before 2040"⁴ and developed countries like NZ are expected to reduce emissions sooner.

What this means for WCC's 5 priority areas:

Firstly, any long term plan that ignores climate change is **not** a long term plan.

Arguably, the greatest challenge this city faces is global climate change. As per WREMO's new risk approach, **risk reduction** is top priority. That means mitigation (rapid reduction of climate-damaging emissions) is top priority for resilience. Rising climate adaptation costs (including infrastructure replacement and insurance) adds urgency to mitigation investment.

WCC already has agreed on the Low Carbon Plan 2016-2018, which requires 10% emissions reductions city-wide (on 2001 levels) by 2020, then other target reductions through to 80% by 2050. But city emissions have not been measured since early 2016 when these decreased by 1.9% from 2001 to 2014⁵. This means our city emissions need to drop by at least a further 8% from 2014 to reach WCC's agreed 2020 target, then by a further 30% to 2030, to 80% below 2001 levels by 2050.

WCC's Low Carbon Plan targets are insufficient to reach NZ's overall 2'C net zero by 2050 target (let alone efforts towards 1.5'C which mean net zero in 2030s). Yet there is no planning in this draft LTP to reach even the modest WCC Low Carbon Plan targets.

WCC's Low Carbon Plan targets are invisible in both the LTP consultation document, and in last year's Let's Get Welly Moving consultation - despite transport driving half of Wellington's emissions.

Proposed so-called "economic catalyst projects" – the airport runway extension, movie museum, convention centre and indoor arena – omit any analysis of climate damage. Currently, the social cost of carbon is conservatively predicted to be NZ\$88 per tonne by 2020 rising to NZ\$176 by 2050⁶, so these costs must be included in all WCC analysis. This includes analysis for projects that rely on increased travel, especially high-impact international travel.

1. Resilience and Environment/ Te manahua me te taiao

OraTaiao strongly supports waste minimisation as an important means to reach nearly net zero climate-damaging emissions during the term of this LTP. We encourage WCC to set annual milestones and a much more ambitious target than reducing waste by a third over the next 9 years.

We also strongly support climate adaptation measures, and urge WCC to allocate more funding over time, as the costs of both climate clean-ups and insurance cover are likely to rise. How much more debt to take on should be tempered by rising climate clean-up costs – and what is needed to drive Wellington's climate-damaging emissions to net zero well before 2050, fairly and fast.

We note with the proposed creation of the world's first predator-free capital, that human changes to our climate present an even greater threat to biodiversity, as our continued climate damage changes environmental conditions faster than the natural ability to change and adapt. Until our city's emissions are net zero, arguably humans are Wellington's most dangerous predator.

2. Housing/ Ngā kāinga

OraTaiao strongly supports WCC rapidly increasing the supply of healthy housing that is affordable to buy, rent and live in, especially social housing. This contributes to at least three of the UN SDGs.

Heathy housing must also be affordable to live in as the costs of climate-damaging emissions rise — this includes housing that requires minimal or no energy to heat or cool, connects with safe walking, cycling and affordable reliable electric public transport, supported by EVs for affordable hourly hire within easy reach. However, resource consents should not be given for building or renovating in areas at significant risk from sea level rises, flooding and slips.

We strongly support the introduction of a Wellington Rental Warrant of Fitness, working in partnership with the University of Otago to ensure heathy housing is the right of all Wellingtonians. When housing is in short supply, people renting are forced to tolerate unacceptable unhealthy living conditions.

3. Transport/ Ngā waka haere

OraTaiao strongly supports:

- Earlier delivery of the Cycling Master Plan, preferably by 2020 (not 2038 and certainly not 2053). Wellingtonians urgently need all age, all ability, safe cycling routes around our city, so that "the healthy choices are the easy choices" (public health mantra) for everyone.

 Anything less carries a huge health cost both in the short and longer climate health term.
- ➤ Introduction of weekend parking fees to discourage private car use, plus lower cost public transport access for community services card holders
- Transport-related initiatives such as safer speed limits, bus priority improvements and better bus shelters. We note though resilience-related roading projects will be increasingly important to deal with increasing climate changes, the top priority must be risk reduction using this LTP to fast-drive Wellington's transport emissions to net zero well before 2050.

OraTaiao strongly supports better active and public transport initiatives from Let's Get Welly Moving (refer our LGWM submission – including scaling up LGWM active and public transport). However, we have serious concerns about the LGWM process, the failure to include or even acknowledge WCC's Low Carbon Plan emissions reductions targets, the failure to apply the Low Carbon Plan's sustainable

transport hierarchy⁷, the failure to take public feedback seriously in analysing scenarios, and the illogical scaling up of active and public transport options with increased roading in the proposed scenarios. The double-spend on roading, which is destabilising our climate to the detriment of human health and our city's economy, has to end. The cheapest and most efficient way to decongest roading is investing in better active and public transport options, plus travel demand measures – without any new roading spending.

So here are the transport step-changes our city needs now:

- complete a comprehensive network of safe, attractive pedestrian and cycling routes for all ages and abilities across our region by 2020 (separate from motorised traffic where possible, lower vehicle speed limits and traffic calming measures where it is not).
- o **start work this year on all-electric light rail from trains to planes** along the people-dense route connecting the railway station, hospital, zoo, Kilbirnie, Miramar and airport.
- o convert all buses to electric as soon as possible before 2020.
- o introduce **travel demand measures** (plus more equitable access) to reduce one-occupant car-driving, reduce congestion, unhealthy air pollution and climate-hostile GHG emissions.
- o encourage measures to **reduce overall transport needs** by increasing urban densification and brown-field rather than green-field new housing developments.
- o Increase fivefold **electric car-share vehicles for hire as public good transport** for affordable hourly hire in 2018 (hundreds of car-share vehicles replace thousands of private cars so our city's scarce land houses more people, not cars), and grow EVs for all private use
- o set a bold target of 80% of the region's residents by 2020 (spread across all ages, genders & abilities) can get their healthy physical activity from more active transport choices.
- o prioritise safe, healthy active transport and public transport in areas with high Māori and Pacific populations, which are designed in partnership with these communities.
- use focus groups and structured individual interviews, to identify both barriers and incentives for greater active transport, public transport and car share uptake (covering diverse socioeconomic situations, culture, locations, household structure, age, stage, gender, responsibilities/activities, and physical abilities/disabilities).
- advocate for the completion of the electrification of all the heavy rail links to Wellington including the North Island Main trunk line, electrification of the freight truck fleet and coastal shipping to move freight.

We note that:

- Around half of NZ adults do not get the weekly physical exercise needed for good health⁸
- o More public transport and car share use can also increase physical activity and health
- o Active and public transport investment (including car share) actively decongests our roads
- E-bikes are revolutionary in our city, flattening hills and conquering the wind
- o Transport design can minimise distances, encouraging urban development in resilient areas
- o Equity of transport access for all ages, abilities and socioeconomic situations, is essential.

4. Sustainable Growth/ Te kauneke tauwhiro

OraTaiao strongly supports planning for population growth by adopting and reaching the UN Sustainable Development Goals. We have scarce land resources and even scarcer atmospheric resources, and the growing gaps between Wellingtonians' wellbeing must be reversed.

We strongly support urgently reviewing the District Plan and Urban Growth Plan, for a fast fair transition to net zero Wellington. Heathy housing must be affordable to buy and rent, and affordable to live in as the costs of climate-damaging emissions rise – this includes housing that requires minimal or no energy to heat or cool, connects with safe walking, cycling and affordable reliable electric public transport, supported by EVs for affordable hourly hire within easy reach. These plans must also start the retreat of buildings from areas at risk from sea level rises, flooding and slips. Resource consents should not be given for building or renovating in at risk areas.

5. Arts and Culture/ Ngā toi me te ahurea

OraTaiao has no comments to make on this LTP priority area, except to repeat that likely climate changes and the social cost of carbon must be included in all WCC analysis, including projects that rely on increased travel, especially high-impact international travel. Currently, the social cost of carbon is conservatively predicted to be NZ\$88 per tonne by 2020 rising to NZ\$176 by 20509, so until international travel relies on renewable energy, global pressure can be expected to reduce this travel. A recent analysis in *Nature* has estimated tourism as now responsible for 8% of global emissions, and rising¹⁰.

Thank you for the opportunity for OraTaiao to make this written submission on WCC's 2018-2028 Long Term Plan. We wish to present our ideas and speak with the Council to support our submission.
