First Quarter Report 2017/18 Financial Year

Highlights

- Pub Charity has approved a \$500,000 grant for redevelopment work on the Chimpanzee Park, This grant will contribute to both animal welfare improvements in the Park, and an improvement to visitor engagement.
- The Wellington Zoo Conservation Fund goes from strength to strength to help us save animals in the wild. We have recently developed a new relationship with the West Coast Penguin Trust and have deepened our commitment to the Jane Goodall Institute NZ, including hosting the JGI NZ office at Wellington Zoo.
- Dr Jane Goodall DBE's visit to Wellington Zoo in late June was incredibly successful with over 200 attending the launch of Wellington Zoo's Rangatahi Programme - a JGI Roots & Shoots initiative engaging young people with their local environment.
- We have retained our Qualmark Enviro Gold certification in the Sustainable Tourism category.
- The Zoo Shop was National Runner Up in the Innovation Category of the national NZ Retail Top Shop Awards held on 7 September. This was for our sustainability initiatives in our retail offering.
- The result for the three months to 30 September 2017 shows an operating deficit of \$136,506 against a budgeted operating deficit of \$174,168.
- Operating Revenue is below budget by \$38K and operating expenditure is below budget YTD September by \$76K.

Challenges this Quarter

The unusually inclement weather this Quarter has had a significant impact on Zoo visitation. We are hoping for better weather for the October holidays.

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Official Opening of the Living Room, July 2017

- The refurbished Living Room was officially opened on 3 July and was celebrated in conjunction with the Zoo receiving its Gold Be.Accessible Certification. The Living Room revamp has completely revitalised the area into a bright and colourful space for school class visits before venturing into the Zoo, maximising the connection between people and animals.
- The LEOTC (Learning Experiences Outside the Classroom) contract with the Ministry of Education with the Zoo as a provider of Science, Technology and Maths based experiences, has been renegotiated for a further three years. The target number of students has been increased to align more closely with our measures.
- The Zoo supported Plastic Free July with a range of visitor programming coinciding with the July School Holidays. We connected visitors with the impact plastic is having on sea birds which are treated in The Nest Te Kōhanga, and encouraged visitors to take action to reduce the use of plastic, particularly shopping bags.

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Tiger Day, August 2017

- Several events were celebrated at the Zoo during Quarter One to raise awareness of some animal species and to broaden participants' understanding of how the Zoo looks after its animals:
 - Tiger Day was celebrated in August with interactive activities available for young visitors.
 - In conjunction with our Community Partner WorkerBe Oasis, Red Panda weekend was held in September and was celebrated with talks from the Rangers and activities.
 - Bee Awareness month dedicated to celebrating bees was incorporated into the Zoo's September's activities with the Wellington Beekeepers Association joining in the festivities.
- As well as Pub Charity's \$500,000 grant for the Chimpanzee habitat renovation, funding towards the operational expenses of the Nest Te K\u00f6hanga was also received from the Koala Trust and Brian Whiteacre Trust.
- Trade Me has renewed its commercial partnership with the Zoo for another year which will
 enable the Zoo to continue to provide engaging experiences and best practice conservation,
 sustainability, animal care and management.
- In Quarter One, we have reached 241,737 people via Facebook with 126,153 post engagements. Twitter has had 117,100 impressions and Instagram with 56,092 impressions.

- As part of the Zoo revolution, the Rangatahi (young people) Roots and Shoots programme for 12-15 year olds who are passionate about animals, people and the environment is being piloted. Launched during her visit to the Zoo in late June, this Roots and Shoots programme will be based on Dr Goodall's four step programme as a model of engagement. Rangatahi will lead change in their communities by mapping needs, collaborating with stakeholders, and designing practical solutions in the form of campaigns around the needs of Animals, People and the Environment (APE).
- Peter Fraser, Conservation Manager, travelled to Kuala Lumpur in September to attend the first International Symposium on Sun Bear Conservation Management. This Symposium was hosted by two of the Zoo's key conservation partners, Free the Bears and TRAFFIC Southeast Asia. The Symposium brought together field researchers, conservation managers, environmental educators and conservation breeding specialists, along with government and industry representatives, to share experiences with the goal of developing a coordinated plan for the conservation of one of Southeast Asia's least known large mammals.
- An 'Injured Wildlife Workshop' was delivered by Zoo staff to wildlife carers, volunteers and new DOC and SPCA staff. This workshop showcased how Wellington Zoo, DOC and SPCA work together to care for wildlife and predominantly focused on how The Nest Te Kōhanga assists with wildlife hospitalisation and handling techniques of various avian species from the wild.

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- The annual Wellington Zoo Conservation Fund Grants, which support members of the Zoo team to visit and help our conservation partners to save animals in the wild, were approved in August. This financial year the successful projects are:
 - West Coast Penguin Trust, Haast and Milford Sound (Phil Wisker)
 - Fauna and Flora International, Vietnam (Ash Howell)
 - Proyecto Titi, Colombia (Maxine Jenkins)
 - Cheetah Outreach, South Africa (Mauritz Basson)
 - Giraffe Conservation Foundation, Namibia (April McMurtrie)
- Zoo staff continued the three year planting programme at the Town Belt site near Manchester Street and planted 500 hundred native trees and shrubs during August (a total of 3,250 to date). This Habitat Restoration programme will make it an improved habitat for birds, reptiles and insects.

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Ali Gregory, Glenn Reddiex and Olivia Rees at the Retail NZ Top Shop Awards 2017

- The National Retail NZ Top Shop Awards were held on 7 September 2017 at the Sky City Convention Centre, Auckland. Wellington Zoo's entry was about its sustainability in retail and we were awarded National Runner-up in the Innovation Award.
- Senior Veterinarian Baukje Lenting co-authored a Laboratory Report titled "Metabolic Bone Disease in North Island Kākā, Nestor meridionalis septentrionalis, in Wellington" in the scientific bulletin "Kōkako". Baukje also co-authored a scientific article titled "Cases of mortality in little penguins (Eudyptula minor) in New Zealand associated with avian malaria", in the New Zealand Veterinary Journal.
- Karen Fifield presented at the Social Enterprise World Forum (SEWF) held in Christchurch at
 the end of September as part of the Guardianship, Stewardship and Environment session. The
 theme for SEWF 2017 was "Ka koroki te manu Creating our tomorrow", and was an invitation
 to all to create a global legacy of positive change and to take an active role in shaping the
 world's future.
